## Bad weather halts final of softball tournament

Aside from a clash with biathlon competitors and the rainout of the championship final, the 10th annual Georgetown Ladies Powderpuff tournament went off without a hitch.

On Sunday morning, the Park School Field was overcrowded with approximately 330 biathlon competitors waiting for the start of their race and about 100 softball players trying to complete their games.

"The Recreation and Parks Department must have overbooked that area. I didn't know anyone was using it until they showed up," said Andrea Ford, the tournament's main organizer.

She said things were crowded for a while, but it didn't affect the playing of the games too much. However, the rain on Sunday afternoon cut short the consolation final midway through the seventh inning, which happened to be her Esobee team, that lost 12-6 to Remax Milton.

The championship final got started around 4:00 p.m., but was rained out in the first inning. As a result, the two finalists, Fuller Custom Homes (Acton) and the Jim Dandies (Ballinafad), last year's defending champion, agreed to make up the game at a later date to decide who gets their name on the trophy.

The Georgetown teams played the polite hosts in the 32 team tournament, with 10 of the 12 local teams losing the first game to enter the consolation round. The only two to advance to the championship side were Udderly Awesome and Simply Red. The Red team beat Midland (1) 16-6, but lost their next game 17-3 to Burlington and were eliminated.

Udderly Awesome, currently in second place in the Georgetown league, put up a good fight, beating Random Ladies 4-1 in the first game on Saturday. They played the next match at 2:30 p.m., beating Orangeville Pharmacy 15-12. However, their hopes of reaching the semi-final were dashed in the next game, when they

were trounced 21-1 by the Acton Marauders. Ca

## Competitors cram fairgrounds for Georgetown biathlon

Georgetown athlete Doug Hagensen hoped to capitalize on the home town field to move ahead in the Nike Biathlon Series, but slipped into third after finishing 10th in the local stage of the competition.

At the start of the Georgetown Biathlon on Sunday, a five kilometer run, 30 kilometer cycle and another five kilometer run, Hagensen was second overall in the series, in which the best five results of the nine races are used to determine a competitor's rank.

Hagensen was trailing Orangeville resident Al Pilcher, who finished first on Sunday, clinching the title with his fourth straight biathlon victory. Pilcher first won the Milton Biathlon on June 16, then the King City Biathlon on July 15, and the Hardagainst Midland on Friday. wood Hills Biathlon, near Barrie.

Guelph native Brian Keast moved ahead of Hagensen in the series by finishing with his third straight third-place finish. Hagensen's best finishes have been a third place finished in the London Biathlon on June 2, a fourth place effort in Milton and a fifth place finish in Hardwood Hills.

Biathlon organizer Gerry Bruce said the Georgetown leg of the series has been the most well attended this summer, with over 300 competitors taking part this past weekend.

"We were expecting 200 and we got 330. There were over 100 last minute registrations, which delayed the start of the event by about an hour. We usually get only about 50-60 signing up on race

Bruce said the biathlon series is in its second year and has grown season. For the Georgetown race next year, he is optimistic of getting 400 competitors.

"We should be able to handle the number all right. The police do a really good job of keeping the course clear."

The Georgetown Biathlon started with a five kilometer running stage, which began at the Fairgrounds. From there, the competitors bicycle to Main Street, turning south to Steeles Avenue and 10th Line and then returned to the Fairgrounds. The final stage required the entrants to repeat the same five kilometer running route.

Bruce said the only problem experienced on the weekend was discovering there was a softball tournament going on at the Fairgrounds at the same time.

"I didn't know about the tournament until the week before. There were a few hundred people there
