Georgetown resident picked for high OPP post

TORONTO - Superintendent Robert W. Chandler has been promoted chief superintendent, Administrative Services Division, Ontario Provincial Police. The promotion became effective May 1, 1990.

Chandler, 44, began his OPP career in 1964 in his hometown of Chatham. Except for a brief posting to Grand Bend in 1972, he remained there until 1977 when he was promoted corporal and transferred to Sioux Lookout Detachment.

Later that year, he moved to Career Management Branch in Toronto, where he was involved with the selection of OPP recruits. In 1981, he was promoted sergeant and moved to Training Branch.

In 1984, Chandler was promoted inspector and moved into Computer Services Branch, where he was responsible for the information technology delivery systems of the OPP.

Most recently, he served as director of the OPP Training Academy in Brampton, a position he held since being promoted superintendent in 1987.

Chief Superintendent Chandler is the son of Irvin and Roberta Chandler of McNaughton Avenue, Chatham. He and his wife Jeanne live in Georgetown with their children Dustin and Brady.

Raid at Terra Cotta residence nets weapons and property

Halton Regional Police estimate about 94 break and enter occurrences will be cleared up after police confiscated an estimated \$50,000 in stolen property during a search warrant executed at a Terra Cotta residence.

Halton police and Guelph OPP executed the search warrant at the Terra Cotta residence Aug. 7 with suspicions the suspects were heavily armed. Arrested at the residence were two males. Further investigations on the same date resulted in the arrest of two males also believed to have been involved in the rural break and enters.

During a search of the residence, police seized 33 firearms and 1,700 rounds of ammunition. Included in the seizure were four machine guns, five replica 9mm Luger pistols, four replica Walther PPK guns, two military assault rifles, a loaded Strun 357 Magnum, six replica grenades and several shotguns, two of which had sawed-off barrels.

Also seized was a large quantity of army style clothing, radios, tools and tool boxes, VCR's and other numerous household articles.

Police say District One Criminal Investigation Bureau and Halton Intelligence Bureau members assisted Guelph Ontario Provincial Police in the investigations. Detectives from Halton CIB investigated

suspect information obtained from Guelph and Caledon OPP.

Police believe property confiscated in the search is related to break-ins in Burlington, Milton, Acton, Georgetown, Barrie, Caledon and Alliston locations. Some weapons and property found at the Terra Cotta residence were taken during break-ins at Acton's BCA Services in June.

It is estimated that \$320,000 in property has been stolen in the rural area break-ins. Police believe the males involved were operating an extensive network as

much of the stolen property was quickly dispersed.

As a result of the seizure, police estimate 23 Milton occurrences dating as far back as December 1989 will be solved. Confiscated property has been related to at least five break-ins in Milton.

Four Rockwood males have been charged with possession of stolen property. Two of the males include a father and son and a third is a young offender. Police are searching for a fifth man believed to be connected to the break-ins.
