

Playoff wins for ball teams

All of the Georgetown rep baseball teams who entered playoff competition are still in the running for championships in their respective divisions.

After playing the first round this past week, all the teams have won their first three-game series except the Re/Max Mike Adams Bantam team, which played last night (Tuesday, after press time).

The Banlam squad lost their first 'D' level game to Glanbrook last week on the road 14-4 and need to win the next two games to advance. If the Bantams have won their Tuesday game, they will play the deciding game tonight at the Fairgrounds at 7:00 p.m.

The Georgetown Quik Lube Pee Wee team came back to win their series in dramatic fashion on Sunday. After losing their first game on the road to Little Britain 5-3 on Saturday, they responded by winning the first Sunday game at the Faigrounds 5-3.

With the series tied 1-1, the deciding game was played 30 minutes later and wound up being tied after seven innings. The Georgetown team had trailed 4-1

earlier in the game, but came back to tie it 4-4 in the bottom of the seventh.

After loading the bases, coach Graham Smith called for a suicide squeeze bunt down the first base line that scored the winning run in the bottom of the eighth inning.

Due to the win, the Pee Wee team advances to the Wheatley 'C' tournament, which is scheduled for the Labor Day weekend.

Baseball Lion Midgets sweep Ancaster to advance to semi-final playoffs this weekend

The Georgetown Lion's Midget team, vying for the title in the Ontario Baseball Association 'C' level, won their quarter-final series against Ancaster, sweeping their opponents two games to none.

The Georgetown team dominated the two matches, winning 13-1 in the first game at home on Wednesday and the second 20-1 in Ancaster on Saturday.

The scoring started slowly in the first game, as the teams tested each other, but then the Eagles scored four runs in the third inning and batted through the order in the fourth to put the hammer down, scoring six more.

The Georgetown boys started a little quicker in the second game, getting three runs in the first inning, sending 13 men to the plate in the second and 10 more in the third to roll up 15 runs early.

Falcons' pitching was solid in both games, with Adam Hagen winning the first, striking out eight over five innings while giving up only four hits. Jim Kerslake relieved and struck out three more to shut Ancaster down.

Greg Dobbin was steady at shortstop and provided his share of offense as well as getting walks and being moved around to score. Trevor Elinesky went two for five

and scored three runs, while chasing everything hit his way in centre field.

Derek Ellard shared duties at first base and played well, getting a run in each game. Pete Lee was the other half of the first base defense and scored two in the second game.
