Representatives from Halton Hills Chamber of Commerce and the Acton 197 Royal Canadian Air Cadets have expressed interest in the house at 333 Maple Avenue in Georgetown.

The house is currently owned by Burlington developer Zupet and Associates. The company is behind the development proposal to build two 15-storey condominiums on the property at 327, 333 and 339 Maple Avenue beside the North Halton Golf and Country Club.

The company, earlier this year, demolished the house at 327 Maple Avenue to make way for the project, if eventually approved by town council. It chose not to save this house arguing the house was ir complete disrepair due to vandalism.

In July, the company made it known it was willing to donate thehouse at 333 Maple Avenue to a non-profit organization. The donation depends on the house being moved from its present location.

Tom Hewer, chairman of the chamber's building committee recently asked the company if the chamber could use the house.

"The chamber's, (current office in the Gordon Alcott Memorial) Arena is too confining," explained

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Mr. Hewer.

He recently had a meeting with Halton Hills Mayor Russ Miller and the town's Director of Recreation and Parks Department Tom Shepard, to discuss the possibility of obtaining land to re-locate the house. No decision came out of the meeting, said Mr. Hewer.

Mayor Miller confirmed the meeting and said the town is willing to work with the chamber to locate a site. Mayor Miller is a member of the chamber.

The mayor made assurances that the town would not be donating any land to the Chamber or selling any land to the Chamber. "But we're willing to work with them to help them find a site," he said.

In offering to help the Chamber, the mayor suggested that an agreement could possibly be found in which the town could share in the use of the house to be used by various local organizations.

"It concerns me when people are showing a lack of respect for other people's property," said the coun-

Coun. Robert Heaton shot back saying people in the neighborhood believe the developers showed no respect for the area when they demolished 327 Maple Avenue.



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
