Store break-in

Approximately \$6,000 in electronics equipment was stolen from Guelph Street GS Electronics after unknown persons smashed out a front window Thursday at about 4 a.m. Stolen property included several camcorders and CD players. It is the second time inside a month the store has been broken into. Police are investigating.

Acton program offered by CMHA

A recreational activity program for sufferers of chronic pyschiatric disorders such as schizophrenia, living in North Halton, is expected to be established in Acton sometime in early winter, said the Executive Director of the Halton Branch of the Canadian Mental Health Association, (CMHA), Pearl Wolfe.

Ms. Wolfe said she would like the program to be established as early as possible but predicts it's only during the early winter that the association will receive the necessary provincial grant of \$42,000

The program, which will be operated out of the Beardmore Tannery - the same housing the North Halton Work Program - will provide the 70 people living in Acion who suffer from a chronic psychiatric disorder a chance to till their spare time productively. something that is sometimes difficult for them, said Ms. Wolfe. The North Halton Work Program has been operating out of the Beard more complex since January and teaches psychiatric patients what it is like to work under normal employment conditions

In explaining how psychiatric patients have difficulty filling their spare time. Ms. Wolfe said, "as a rule they feel isolated and therefore they have nothing to do "

Ms Wolfe predicted once the program is started not all the people who could take advantage of the program will get involved. It takes a long time for psychiatric patients to feel comfortable in a social setting, she explained.

The provincial government announced the grant in late August and Ms Wolfe said she has no reason to believe the newly-elected provincial government won't honor this financial commitment. A similar sum was also promised by the government of the day to establish the same program in Burlington, said Ms. Wolfe.

The underlying theme of the recreational program, said Ms Wolfe, is that the participants willbe asked what activities they want. "We feel strongly that it's their program, the participants will be encouraged to help design it," she Said.

Examples of some of the activities that might be offered include, outings, pienies, mini-golf, and ice skating in the winter, said Ms Wolfe

Another important aspect of the program is community outreach.

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said Ms. Wolfe. The participants will be introduced to the local library, the YMCA and YWCA so that they can go out on their own

munity, explained Ms. Wolfe. Meanwhile, the North Halton Mental Health Clinic located in Milton has announced that it is to receive \$45,500 in provincial grant money to improve services for its psychogeriatric clients, according to a press release. The money will be used to hire an additional

and get involved with the com-

therapist with psychiatric experience, states the release.


"This staff increase will assist in providing increased numbers of early identification psychogeriatric assessments. The program will provide consultative services to other communities and support agencies working with the elderly and expand the educational component."
