

Federal grant committed for recycling project

The Federal Government has committed a grant of \$167,400 to the Waste Not recycling project in Georgetown that will be given out over a three-year period, said the project's director, Diane Vandevalk.

In order to actually start up the recyclable materials and collection and sorting centre, Ms. Vandevalk said an equivalent amount must still be raised.

Ms. Vandevalk said she plans to approach private industry for some of the money and the provincial government for the remainder. The spokesperson is optimistic private industry will be receptive to the project since the idea was endorsed by Halton Hills council earlier this year.

As for the provincial government, Ms. Vandevalk said, she is currently trying to set up a meeting with the Ministry of Environment. She predicts the government will be receptive since it is "looking for innovative ways to reduce the waste stream."

Once it becomes operational, Waste Not will be a depot for ap-

pliances, clothing and recyclables such as fine paper, not already collected through the town's bluebox program.

Everything collected will be first repaired or cleaned up if necessary, and then resold, said Ms. Vandevalk.

People will be able to donate goods to Waste Not either by leaving the items at the curbside on any of the 15 special collection days the town has every year or by dropping off the items at the project's headquarters.

Ms. Vandevalk is currently negotiating with Canterra Investments to use the company-owned Barber Mill property on River Road in Georgetown as the Waste Not location.

Once a location has been determined and all the money is in

place, Ms. Vandevalk said the project would become operational four weeks later. She's hopeful the project will start up sometime this Fall.

Once it gets started, "it will be the first of its kind," said Ms. Vandevalk. She predicted Halton Hills residents will participate in the project because they are environmentally aware and have a real sense of community and what is good for the community.

The Federal government grant was part of \$2.6 million allocated to 89 projects under the Federal government's environmental department program, the Environmental Partners Fund. The fund provides local environmental projects with cash up to 50 per cent of the costs to a maximum of \$200,000 over three years.
