The membership owes a debt of gratitude to the 53 volunteers who took part and particularly Mrs. Florence Smith who was there nine times, Mary Persons 7 times and Grant Greenaway 6 times. Contract awarded

Halton Regional Planning and Public Works Committee recommended Wednesday that the construction company Wellington Construction Limited build the iron removal facility at the Tenth Line Plumbing Station in Halton Hills.

Regional Council will vote on the recommendation Wednesday.

The construction company's estimate of \$514,000 was the lowest bid of 13 companies but it was still \$127,546 more than the Region had budgeted, according to a Regional Public Works report. Money from the Region's Capital Reserve Fund and Residential Lot Levy will be used to make up the difference, the report indicates.
