These young men endured dreadful hardships. Their courage, strength and dedication of duty against terrible odds will remain forever a source of pride to Canada and all Canadians. 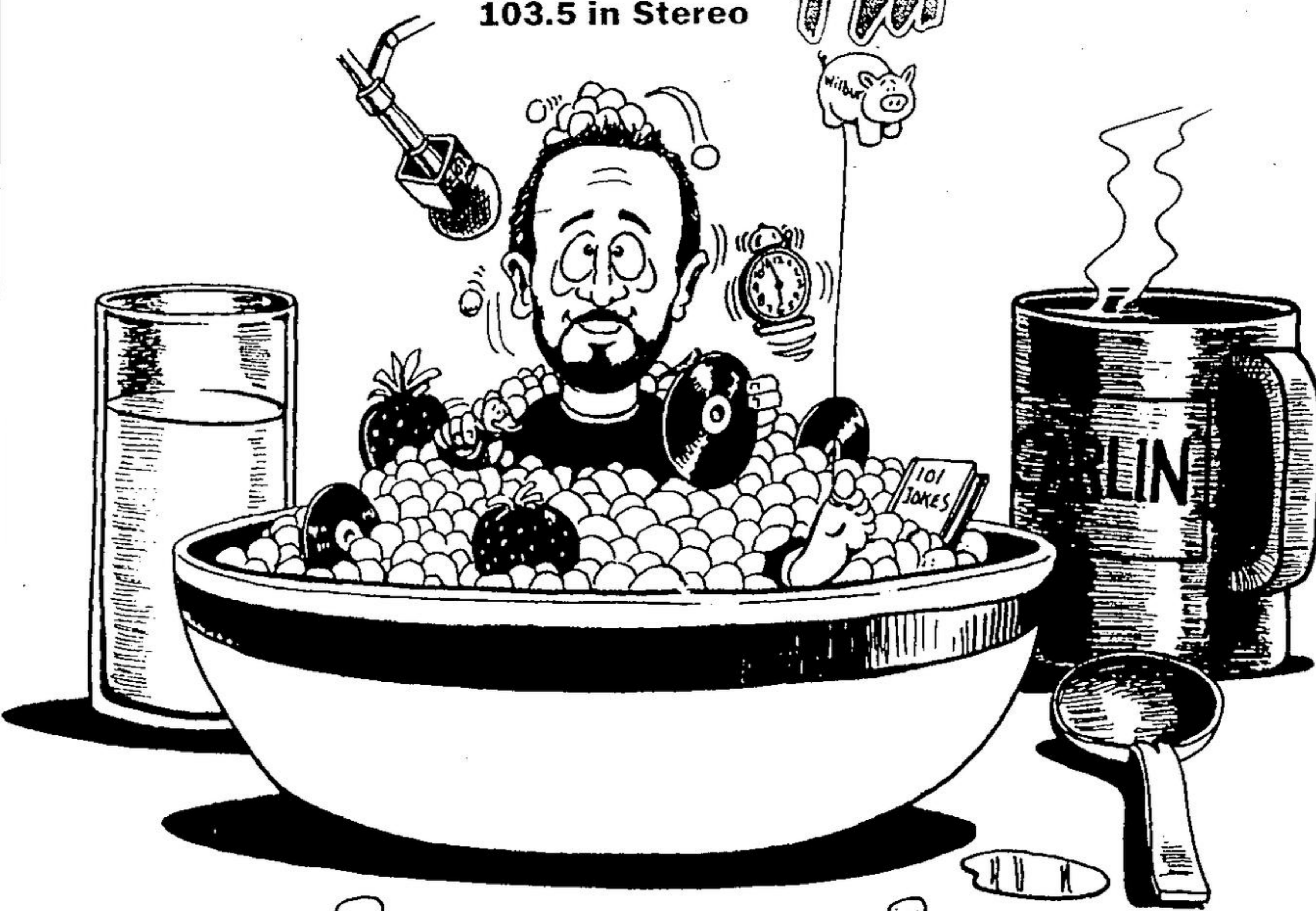
