Double Jr. B hockey affiliation on the horizon for Acton Sabres

The Acton Jr. C Sabres and the Georgetown Jr. B Raiders are scheduled to sign an affiliation agreement today, giving the Sabres two affiliations in less than three weeks.

Earlier this month, Sabre owner Mitch Lajeunesse and the Milton Jr. B. Merchants affiliated their organizations, a move which was allowed by the Ontario Hockey Association due to the remergence of Fergus in the Mid-Ontario Junior Cloop.

"They were drawing players from Wellington County, which is an area we had been getting people from in the past. Now that we needed to get a new source, so we were able to sign with Milton," said Lajeunesse.

The Milton team is affiliated with the Kitchener Rangers Jr. A team, which has already resulted in benefits for Acton said the Sabre owner.

"We got Michael Rusk, a left winger and Jason Sawyer, a defenceman, from Milton since they were sent down when Kitchener made some cuts from their team and Milton had to make room. Rusk will help with our scoring and Sawyer will be a real asset to our defence on the right wing

along with John Van Dam."

Lajeunesse was confident the deal will pay dividends throughout the season, since they will be able to fill some positions with the more experienced Jr. B level players.

"It will make a difference this season. We seemed to be a line short last year, especially against the stronger teams like Orangeville and Bradford. Our defence will be stronger and now we should be able to score more goals too."

The affiliation between the Raiders and Sabres marks the second straight year the two organizations have collaborated,

an arrangement Raider General Manager Joe Walsh said ran smoothly for both sides.

"It allows us to carry some extra cards. After January 10, we're only allowed 21 cards, but the affiliation enables us to go beyond that number. It's sort of like an insurance policy if we run into a number of injuries just before the playoffs."

Lajeunese said the affiliation system also benefits the players, since they will remain with an organization, such as the Kitchener Rangers, even if they are moved to the Jr. C level for a period of time.

Sabres suffer exhibition game setbacks

The Acton Jr. C Sabres are tak-

ing a little more of the bad than the good in pre-season hockey so far this year.

After losing their first two games 4-3 and 8-1, the Sabres dropped last

After losing their first two games 4-3 and 8-1, the Sabres dropped last Thursday's game against Flamboro 9-8, won Friday's game against Stayner 3-2 at Alcott Arena and were overpowered 7-3 by Schomberg on Monday.

Their woes didn't end there either Jason Sawyer, a recent acquisition from the Milton Merchants Jr. B team, their new affiliate, suffered a partially separated shoulder in Schomberg.

Sabre owner Mitch Lajeunesse said Sawyer is one of his team's defensive cornerstones and hoped for a speedy recovery, since his player had to be taken to hospital for observation.

"It doesn't seem to be as bad as we first thought. His shoulder went back into place on its own, but we'll have to see how things go."

Lajeunesse said his team has no problems playing a physical game, but criticized the officials for letting the game get out of hand.

"That was definitely the worst officiating I've seen, including all the games we played last year. The guy who hit Jason from behind wasn't even given a penalty and he was put into the boards from five feet out."

Both Lajeunesse and coach Ken Steen said they are more interested in looking for some big players this week to help keep the other teams "more honest". The owner said he is also looking forward to his team's next meeting against their rivals from Schomberg.

In Thursday's game against Flamboro, the Sabres came back from a 7-1 deficit in the second period to tie it up 8-8 late in the final frame. A Flamboro goal at 3:55 proved to be the winner, however.

Sabre player Shawn Hassefelt had a productive night, scoring two goals and assisting on three others. Hassefelt notched the first Sabre marker on a powerplay in the first period, the only Acton goal until the final six minutes of the second

Four quick goals by the Flamboro team in the second period didn't help Acton's chances for winning this match, especially two shorthanded efforts that they gave up just 22 seconds apart.

Acton turned things around in Friday's game against Stayner, playing a tighter checking game, which resulted in a 3-2 victory.

The Sabres got two quick markers to open the third period, taking a 3-0 lead on goals by Jason Lucas and Mike Brooks. Jamie Curran assisted on both of the plays, which came just over a minute apart.

Stayner fought back with a powerplay goal with six minutes remaining, due to a double minor

butt-ending penalty by goalie Jim Mantione. Stayner managed one more after pulling their goalie, but were unable to tie it up.

The Sabres play Flamboro on Friday night at Alcott Arena. Their last exhibition match is in Mount Forest on Sept. 30, before they begin the regular season on Oct. 5 in Alliston.
