

Police Beat

Surrenders to police

An 18-year-old Georgetown high school student turned himself into police on Wednesday after he failed to report a Sept. 17 accident near Fifth Line and just north of Sideroad 22.

Witnesses told police the driver failed to negotiate a turn and the 1985 grey Hyundai Stellar went out of control and struck a road sign and guard rail receiving front and side damage. The vehicle left the scene southbound on Fifth Line.

As a result of police appeals to the public via local newspapers, the student met with police at the Georgetown station and admitted to have been operating the Hyundai during the accident.

Police charged the student with careless driving, failing to report an accident, failing to remain at the scene of an accident and failing to report damages caused by an accident.

Shelves were bare

The Hornby Park concession booth was hit again last weekend, however, the culprits left empty handed as there was no stock in the booth. The unknown persons pried open a swinging door of the booth and unbolted the door. Police say they rummaged through a fridge but found nothing.

Home entered

School vandalized

Unknown persons caused \$750 in damages to the Holy Cross Catholic School on Maple Avenue after nearly a dozen windows were broken Tuesday at 8:30 p.m. Police say the windows were broken by pellets shot from a BB gun.

Damage to car

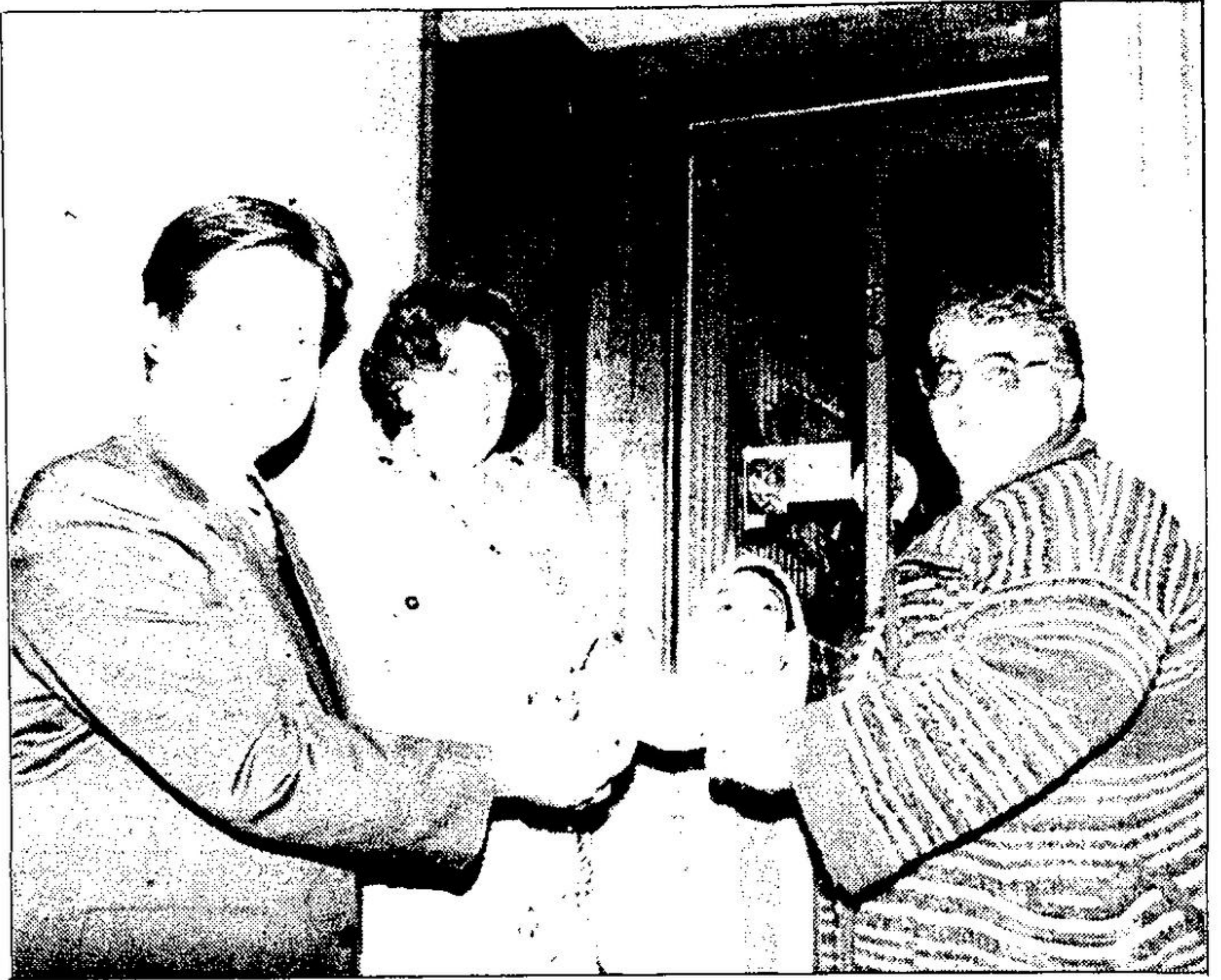

Pomeroy votes in favor of CAP reconsideration

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He explained the accumulated and operating deficit of both senior levels of government - federal and provincial - is lowering the living standard of all Canadians including the very people the CAP program is meant to help. "Everyone suffers when governments overspend revenues," said the mayor. He estimated Canada has one of the largest debts in the world if not the largest per capita.

Halton Regional Health and Social Services staff supported the resolution in their report arguing the deficit reduction measure is "at the expense of Canada's most vulnerable citizens - the unemployed and poor, abused women and children and dependent elderly and disabled persons."

According to the report, limiting CAP funding has already forced

the province of Ontario to reduce funding in the area of child care.

Burlington councillor Walter Mulkeiwich echoed the opinions of many of those councillors who supported the resolution arguing that the Region isn't requesting the Federal Government definitely rescind its legislation. Halton is on-

ly asking the Federal Government to reconsider its decision.

Recognizing Mayor Bird's concern about the Federal Government's deficit, Coun. Mulkeiwich explained municipal and provincial governments are concerned with the action and want their opinions taken into account.

Rash of break-ins
