

Executive Committee rejects town offer

The executive committee was not idle during the summer. Working around holidays it evaluated closely an offer from the Parks and Recreation Department to rent us space for a temporary Seniors Centre in the Sacre Coeur Hall. During this process the two major seniors clubs in town, Belles and Beaus and the Golden Circle were consulted.

When we received word on the

rent to be charged for this we replied to Mr. Shepard regretfully rejecting the offer for the following reasons.

1. The kitchen is not available to us to help raise money and provide light meals.
2. The entrance onto Guelph St. is not good and would be a constant hazard.

3. The ambience of the hall is depressing, it is not easy to make comfortable and inviting.

4. While it is practical for larger scale activities, e.g. shuffleboard, carpet-bowling, fitness programmes, bingo, movies and dancing. It is not suitable for socializing as in a drop-in centre. Arts and crafts and casual games and activities

would be difficult to program there.

5. The cost of the hall is prohibitive to us. All of our revenue from fund raising is devoted to a building fund to be used for building a seniors' centre. Any ongoing expense such as this would seriously detract from our main purpose.

6. The resources of people required to run the programs would also deplete the resources

available for all the work entailed in getting our own permanent building.

7. In view of the fact that there is nothing in the plans of council that promises a seniors' centre for Georgetown in the foreseeable future temporary accommodation such as offered by this hall may even more indefinitely postpone the realization of a permanent seniors' centre.
