Milton ruins Raider's weekend

The Georgetown Raiders dropped a pair of games against Milton on the weekend, losing 9-3 on the road and 6-5 at home on Saturday.

Raider coach Gary McFadyen said he was more disappointed in losing a 5-4 third period lead on Saturday than in how the team worked together on the ice.

"The guys were trying out there, but some of the penalties hurt us. We led for most of the game, but just couldn't put it away."

The Raiders were tied 2-2 at the end of one period, thanks to goals from Dan Fennell and Davin Singler and tight checking by the defence.

In the second period, Dwayne Lewis, Blair Catherwood and Charles Officer found the Milton net to give their team a 5-4 score going into the final frame.

Play on both sides of the ice was close, but the Milton team took advantage of a Raider penalty at 5:50 to tie the game. Just 17 seconds later, Milton notched the winner to win 6-5.

McFadyen said Friday's game wasn't as tight a game as he would have liked, losing 9-3 in Milton.

"After the first period it was 2-2. The guys looked pretty good and were playing pretty strong in both ends," he said.

Football game cancelled due to absence of referees

Rick Redshaw, coach of the senior team, said the Secondary Athletic Convenor for the Halton Board of Education, made an error in scheduling, which resulted in the mix-up.

Steen said the team will also be working on acclimating the newer players to the smaller Acton ice surface before they play their home opener on Friday against Wingham at 8:00 p.m.

Rebels run in U.S. meet

Two of Georgetown District High School senior boys cross-country members ventured off this past weekend to Rochester, New York to compete in the prestigious McQuaid cross-country Invitational meet.

Dan Campbell and Martin Davison, who also ran on Thursday in the Oktoberfest 8.1 km race, did have thoughts of fatigue in the back of their minds, but both fared well as Dan Campbell finished 18th and Martin Davison 30th in a field

of over 130 runners in the 5 km AAA varsity category.

The 5 km race is much shorter and faster than the two runners are used to, but they both showed much improvement over last year's performance at the McQuaid meet, the second largest meet in North America. Over 5,500 male and female championship calibre high school runners from across the United States competed in the event.

Campbell and Davison are both looking forward to joining their team in this Saturday's meet at High Park.
