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Volleyball Rebels bounce visitors

All three of the Georgetown District High School Rebel volleyball teams played poor hosts to Morningstar, a team from Peel Region that visited for an afternoon of exhibition matches.

The Rebel teams all dominated their opponents, including sweeps by the midget and juniors, while the seniors won three out of five sets.

Bob McKay, the senior team coach, said he was pleased with the results, especially after his squad had lost their last game to

league rivals E.C. Drury on Oct. 4.

McKay said that most of Morningstar's players were bigger than the GDHS athletes, but said bigger isn't always better.

"We really frustrated them with our sound defensive play. A good defense can really take the game away from an opponent. We were a lot quicker in our play, getting to the ball better."

McKay said that while the team is happy with the results from the exhibition game (15-10,

16-14, 15-11, 7-15, 14-16), they are focusing on this weekend's tournament in Applewood at Applewood in Mississauga.

"It should be a good experience for us, with a lot of other very competitive teams there. I've heard there are some teams from as far east as Oshawa and from the west from London and Windsor."

The junior volleyball team played six matches against Morningstar, taking all of them from the visitors, which was

something the team hadn't expected.

"We were really worried about how we would do against their team, since they had a reputation for being near the top of their league," said Sheril Cave, the team's assistant coach.

The junior rebels only needed to exceed the regular 15 point set once, winning the games 15-6, 15-2, 16-14, 15-8, 15-4 and 15-2.

The Midgets won their first two battles 15-12, 15-12 before taking a little more control in the third set to win 15-7. The Rebels won the fourth set 15-10, followed by 15-8 and 15-10 victories.

In other GDHS games, the field hockey results showed both the junior and senior teams tying their opponents, both of them being Nelson teams.

The juniors tied 1-1, while the seniors kept pace with a 0-0 finish at home against Nelson.

The midget and junior basketball teams didn't have much luck at home against their opponents on Tuesday evening. The juniors lost 37-29 to Bishop Reding, while the midgets were put out by a 44-20 score.

The Rebels junior football team had another tough outing on Wednesday when they faced undefeated T.A. Blakelock on the road. The Rebels lost 42-20, but coach Fred Kotani said one bright spot was scoring 20 points, when three previous Blakelock opponents had only managed a total of six.

The midget basketball team didn't have much luck against Bishop Reding, which visited GDHS on Tuesday and won 44-20. The junior Reding squad also went home winners, beating the Rebels 37-29 that same afternoon.

Shorthanded Atom goal puts away Orangeville

Star Fuels Major Atoms opened their regular season in Orangeville on Monday night with a come from behind 3-2 win.

Having lost four players from last year's team, coach John Andrews was forced to go with just six forwards and four defencemen. There will be no complaints about ice time this season, as each of the ten skaters plays half the game.

Just over two minutes into the game, a shot from the Georgetown faceoff circle went off a defender's stick and Orangeville took a 1-0 lead. Kevin Humeniski held the opposition scoreless for the remainder of the first period and into the second.

With Georgetown pressing, an Orangeville forward snuck in behind the defence and increased their lead to 2-0. The best chance of the period came when Fraser Brown used his blinding speed to go in all alone from the red line, but his high shot was caught by the Orangeville netminder, and after two periods, the good guys were scoreless.

Georgetown came out flying in the final frame and started to take over a minute into the period. Defenceman David Papadopoulos and Ricky Clark combined to send Andrew Beaven in alone, and his quick shot to the stick side put Georgetown on the board. This goal gave the Georgetown team momentum and it was just a mat-

ter of time before they tied the game.

With just over nine minutes left in the game Allan Rasmussen stole the puck from a defender and passed to Brad Kouyoumjian behind the net. Kouyoumjian darted out front and buried a backhand shot to the far corner.

Georgetown seemed to let down at that point and only the stalwart play of the defence of Papadopoulos, Steven Smith, Michael Crawford, Clark and goaltender Scott Herbert kept the score tied.

With just over four minutes left in the game Georgetown was assessed a minor penalty and Orangeville again started swarming over the net. Then Andrew Beaven pounced on a loose puck inside his blueline and outraced two Orangeville players the length of the ice before firing a bullet over the goalie's right shoulder.

This shorthanded effort proved to be the winner as Georgetown held on for a 3-2 win.

The home opener is on Sunday, Oct. 14th at 6:00 p.m. at Memorial against Erin.

The remaining two players on the team (not previously mentioned) are Ryan Boudreau and Cameron Hunter. John Andrews is the coach and Brian Clark the manager.

Andrews said after the game, "we have a lot of work to do with regards to positional play, but no one could fault the effort or the spirit the boys showed tonight."
