Focus on Fitness

Caffeine and exercise

Caffeine is quickly absorbed into the bloodstream and affects multiple systems within the body. It stimulates the central nervous system and increases heart rate, digestive secretions, respiration rate, metabolic rate and urine output.

How the stimulant affects overall health is still largely a mystery. It is known that caffeine can aggravate an ulcer or worsen heartburn in some people. Also, women with fibrocystic breast disease often report relief from their symptoms after they eliminate caffeine from their . diets.

Caffeine has been alternately indicated and vindicated for its role in several other diseases. However, there is no conclusive evidence that caffeine increases the risk of cancer, high blook pressure, heart disease or high cholesterol levels, or that it causes birth defects.

What is a "safe" level of caffeine? It-depends on body size and individual tolerance, but generally an intake of 200 to 300 milligrams daily (about two or three cups of brewed coffee) for adults is considered moderate.

Research continues on the effects of caffeine on performance. In a typical one-hour aerobics class, caffeine probably makes little difference in activity level.

Meanwhile endurance athletes who perceive that their performance is enhanced by caffeine are well advised to keep their intake at moderate levels to avoid any potential ill effects.

Remember some teas, sodas, chocolate and medications also contain caffeine, so be sure to read product labels.

At 7:43 of the second period, Jamie Briggs scored the games first goal on a rebound from a Justin Davis shot.

Later in the period, Steve Roy and Doug Janjevich came close on a goal crease scramble. Curtis Carr broke in alone only to be

stopped by the Hamilton goalie with a pad save, and Darin Finlayson scored with 17 seconds left in the period only to have it disallowed due to a high stick.

In the third period. Hamilton brought the play to the Hurricanes, tying the game 1-1 at the 9:03 mark. Moments later. Harthold. Mashinter and Walker put pressure on the Huskies' netminder but couldn't find the mesh With 3:43 remaining in the game. Hamilton scored their second to take a 2-1 lead

With just over a minute left coach Sharer pulled his goalie in favour of a 6th attacker. At 42 seconds the move paid off. Doug Janjevich won a face off to the left of the Hamilton net, pulled the puck back to Justin Davis who quickly put it in the bottom corner to tie the game at 2-2.

On Sunday night, the Hurricanes faced off against the Detroit GPD. This was a must win game as the Huskies had defeated the Reps only moments earlier.

Halton controlled the play through much of the first period with Jeff Langille making two sparkling saves and Baynton, Neff, Taylor and Page controlling their defensive zone.

It wasn't until 4:17 of the second period that Detroit scored the games first goal on a low shot just inside the post. Before the period ended Janjevich left one on the goal line that Carr was not able to get to before the Detroit goalie smothered it.

Early in the third Andrew Hartholt, Jamie Walker and Peter Mashinter fired a flurry of shots at the Detroit goal with Mashinter just missing on what looked to be the tying goal.

Shortly after this close call the GPD's exploded for three quick goals to blow the game open.

It was not until 3:26 of the third that Justin Davis took a lead pass from Jamie Briggs, beat the last defenceman and deked the goalie for the Hurricanes only goal. Final - Detroit 4, Halton 1, Jamie Walker was voted the games MVP.

The first of defenceman Amato's game-tying goals came from a round the net manouver by Mulley with the defenceman pinching in to connect with the pass.

Halton's equalizer, with 2:12 left on the clock, was a shorthanded effort resulting from tough fore-checking by Cox, and his pass to Amato on the left point. He made no mistake with a high floating shot to the top right

corner. The Hurricanes continued their league schedule on Sunday in Barrie, but the long trek north was in vain, as Halton suffered their first league-play defeat of the year.


Barrie opened the scoring quickly, after intense early pressure around the Halton net, but the visitors equalized late in the period when a Henneberry pass from the left corner was relayed by Wade Burrows to Dubien who rifled a shot from the right point.

Barrie regained the lead with a power play marker in the second, then added two more early in the third to take a 4-1 lead. The game appeared to turn around with less than 10 minutes remaining when 3 Henneberry leveled the Barrie goalie at the side of the net to free the puck and allow Mulley to score unassisted.

The Hurricanes scored again, 27 seconds later, when Bourgeois converted a Cox-Mulley set up around the Barrie net, to pull back to 4-3. The locals then turned up the heat on a tiring and depleted Halton squad, with three unanswered goals in the closing minutes, to clinch the 7-3 win.



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
