The senior Rebel football team captured first place after coming back from an 8-0 deficit to defeat the Perdue Panthers 17-10.

Georgetown, after the victory, had a 2-0 record while the best the other teams had to offer was a 1-1 record.

The first Perdue touchdown came in the second quarter in the form of a 22-yard pass to give the Panthers a 6-0 lead.

A faked conversion added another two points to Perdues lead. Before the second half of the game the Rebels had cut that lead to 8-7 with a touchdown.

The second Rebel touchdown occurred when a bad throw was scooped up off of the ground by a Rebel player and rushed to the Panther end-zone to give Georgetown a 13-8 lead over Perdue. Five plays later a Rebel field goal further increased that lead to 17-8.

The Panthers gained hope in the fourth quarter when a bad snap on a punt forced the kicker into his own end-zone giving Perdue a chance to tie the game with a converted touchdown, but Georgetown interceptions put a swift end to that particular threat.

10 Years Ago

Many internal problems with

the Halton regional police department, that have been around since the departments' creation in 1974, had been rectified according to a report that was presented to regional council.

The police department had conducted a year-long study on the internal problems facing the police force. Improvements had been made but the department was still a long way away from being perfect. One of the improvements was to help solve a serious manpower shortage.

The internal investigation showed that the Halton Police Force was not as efficient as it should have been. The department had planned to increase its in-service training, concentrating on racial discrimination problems, and community rela-

The records bureau of the department had been cleaned up and was moving towards computerization, and the Criminal Identification Bureau was improved after being centralized.

Francis Grainger Quigley: Victoria Cross Winner. Born in Toronto, July 10, 1894. In the spring of 1917 he was sent to France to join no. 70, a Camel Squadron. In the autumn of 1917 he was awarded the M.C. for gallantry. He flew almost around the clock during the next two days, firing 3.000 rounds at enemy infantry, dropped 30 bombs and shot down a number of enemy aircraft. In one fight, he shot down a balloon and all four German fighters defending it. Wounded in 1918, he was sent back to Armour Heights where he contacted influenza and died. Francis Grainger Quigley is buried in his native Toronto.






