Raiders halt losing streak with victory over Brampton

The Georgetown Raiders got their first wins of the season this past week, beating Brampton 7-2 on Thursday and Burlington 3-2 on Saturday.

The night was a productive one for the line of Blair Catherwood, Scott Humber and Duane Lewis, which connected for five of the seven goals and a total of 13 points.

Catherwood notched a hat trick and assisted on two other goals, while Humber got a pair and three assists, followed by Lewis with three assists.

Previous to Saturday's game,

Burlington was unbeaten this season, a fact which wasn't lost on coach Gary McFadyen.

"I'm very pleased with the way
the guys played in both games
against two very good teams. I
think the whole team feels great
about it, it gives them and the
management confidence - we
know we can play with anybody
in this league and we showed it."

Helping increase their confidence was the ability of their big line to come through again in their second game. Catherwood scored the first goal, assisted by Humber and Lewis to get the team going. Humber assisted on the second goal when he set up

Matt Rudnicki.

To add to the team's good fortune, one of the team's key players, Rob Doucette, looked to be fully recovered from the shoulder surgery he underwent last year, scoring the game winner at 11:14 of the final period.

"He (Doucette) was feeling pretty good out there. After scoring, he was trying to do some end to end rushes," said McFadyen.

Solid goaltending was also on the menu for the Raiders, with Jason Nicholson getting the nod for both matches. He stopped 23 shots in Brampton, and kept the door closed on Burlington which outshot Georgetown 35-25. "Nicholson really steadies things up for us in our end, he knows what to do with the puck. The defence has been working really well together lately," said McFadyen.

The coach added that he was also happy with the way the team has developed and the different strengths they have demonstrated.

"On Thursday they showed they can put out a lot of offence and on Saturday they showed they could play a strong, controlled defensive game. We could have gone 0-5 to start off, putting us in a really big hole, but things look different now."

The Georgetown District High School Rebels senior football team is still searching for its first win of the season after losing 10-0 to Burlington Central on Friday afternoon.

Coach Rick Redshaw said weather played a part in limiting some aspects of his team's play, though he didn't put all the blame on Mother Nature.

"With the pouring rain that day, it was really tough to make our passing game work. We had a lot of trouble getting into their end zone, but we definitely had some chances. Three times we got inside their ten-yard line, but couldn't score."

Those three attempts were stopped by an interception on the first drive, a fumble on the next and the team was unable to make a short first down attempt on the last.

Though he said some of his backs had trouble getting their footing in the soggy field, receiver Rich Mulgrew made the best of a bad day by catching two 30-yard passes for good field position each time.

"I'm encouraged by the way we contained their offence, which isn't easy since they have a minor program which helps develop them earlier than our players. They're a good hitting team which is tough to run against. That's why we're working on our ground attack a bit more now," said Redshaw.

The senior girls basketball team lost their second game in a row on Thursday, due to a 43-33 decision dealt to them by the by Bishop Reding hosts.

The seniors had dropped their last meeting the previous Thursday at home to E.C. Drury, and weren't able to overcome the point differential put on the board by Reding this week.

"They stayed ahead of us the whole time. They got up by 15 points at one time, but our team fought back, playing a lot better in the second half, but we couldn't get closer than five points," said Gary Southworth, the senior coach.

The team played their most recent tournament this past weekend in Port Credit, losing two of their three games.

"We saw a lot of good teams playing there this weekend. In our first game, we lost 55-25 to Chatham-Kent on Friday and our first game on Saturday, we lost 44-37 to Applewood,"

Southworth said the team faired a lot better against their next opponent, beating Bramalea 59-17.

On the positive side, the junior basketball team avenged their older counterparts in league action Thursday by beating Reding 53-30 and improved their record to 4-1.

"That game was ours right from the start. We led 12-2 in the first three minutes and pretty much controlled things from there," said Southworth.
