Midget team improves record with 6-3 win over Brampton

The Canada Brick Halton Hurricane Midgets only saw action once this past week, but made it count, as they improved their record to 3-2-1 with a 6-3 win away over Brampton on Sunday.

Head coach Charlie Hanman was very pleased with his team's effort. "This is the game where we showed we're a good solid hockey team," Hanman said.

Brampton opened the scoring early in the first on a screened backhand that found the mark-past Hurricane netminder Peter Downs.

It didn't take long for Canada Brick to come back. Wade Burrows passed to defence partner Damlen Dubrin in their own end. Dubrin hit Rob Crowe cruising at the red line with a perfect lead pass. Crowe stepped around the Brampton defence and blistered a slapshot past a stunned goaltender.

Todd Mulley made it 2-1 from the slot after taking a flawless feed from minor midget call-up Mike McPahil, with an assist also going to Crowe. Downs then made the biggest save of the game as he made a brilliant stop on a Brampton breakaway. Brampton managed to tie the game with one second left in the first period.

Mike Cox re-opened the Halton lead early in the second frame as he stripped the puck from the Brampton goalie, spun and fired it into an open net. Brampton came right back to tie it at three.

Canada Brick then took the lead for keeps. On a power play in the Brampton end, centre Patrick Hennenberry drew to defenceman Brad Demato who fed Cox in the slot. Cox wrist shot found the mark.

Sean Bourgeois scored on a goal-mouth scramble with assists going to Hennenberry and Dubrin to close the second period scor-

ing.

Mulley scored on a slapshot from just outside the blueline with an assist going to Bourgeois to make it 6-3 Halton and put the team back over the .500 mark on the season.

The Hurricanes play two games at home this week. On Friday they have a rematch with Brampton at Georgetown's

Alcott Arena at 8:30 p.m. On Saturday they host Chinguacousy at Flamboro's North Wentworth Arena at 6:00 p.m.
