Leading the way were Jody Johnson with a first in the midget girls three km race and a first for Dan Campbell in the senior boys 8.2 km event.

The senior boys team also captured 1st place honors, following Dan Campbell were Martin Davison 3rd, Chris Adams 9th, Doug Matthews 12th and Curtis Withers 35th.

Leading the way for the junior girls was Kristy Johnson

finishing 2nd in the 4.1 km race, following Kristy were Leslie Scarth, 17th, Melissa Duncan 24th, Tracy Cox 26th and Ingrid Waterman 27th.

In the junior boys category Bruce Ryan finished 14th in the 6 km race. Following Bruce were Ryan Trant 19th, Kevin McMurray 28th, Rich Long 29th and Billy Rommeluere 48th.

Note that Bruce Ryan, Rich Long and Bill Rommeluere are midget runners that ran in the junior race. Although the team is small, the efforts of the runners is strong, and all are looking forward to the GHAC championships held today at Kelso Conservation Area.

Kennedy places third at cross country event

Elementary school students from the Georgetown area accounted well for themselves at cross country meets held at Bronte Creek Park earlier this month, earning one second and three third place finishes.

The Halton County Junior Cross Country meet, held on Oct. 10, featured 50 schools and included 1,022 students. Out of this group, George Kennedy School placed third in the Atom Girls division, followed by Park School in sixth.

George Kennedy School also did well in the Bantam Boys group, finishing fifth overall. Robert LaRose's third place finish out of 193 others in the Bantam group helped his school earn that ranking.

Ashley Monckton of Harrison School came in fourth in the Bantam Girls section out of 157 other racers. Mark McInnis of Harrison earned a third place finish in the Atom Boys division and Erynn Ballard of Pineview placed fifth in the Atom Girls.

On Oct. 15, the Halton County Senior Cross Country meet was held at Bronte Creek, which hosted 18 schools and 510 students

competitors.

Stewarttown School won a second place finish in the junior girls division, followed by Centennial School in sixth. Centennial also did well in the junior boys section, getting a 10th place finish, which was ahead of Acton's McKenzie-Smith School in 13th.

Centennial and McKenzie-Smith challenged each other again in the Intermediate Boys division, this time with the Acton school finishing ahead in 11th and Centennial in 14th.

Centennial did well in the senior boys and girls division, placing third in the girls and sixth in the boys. Stewarttown placed 14th in the senior boys, followed by McKenzie-Smith in 16th.

Stewarttown School dominated in the Junior Girls individual races with a fifth place showing from Bridget Campbell, sixth from Katie Scruton and ninth from Roanne Sones, out of 49 racers.

Centennial followed suit with two good finishes in the Senior Girls division, featuring Esther Copland and Jen Knapp who placed seventh and 10th respectively out of 67 students.

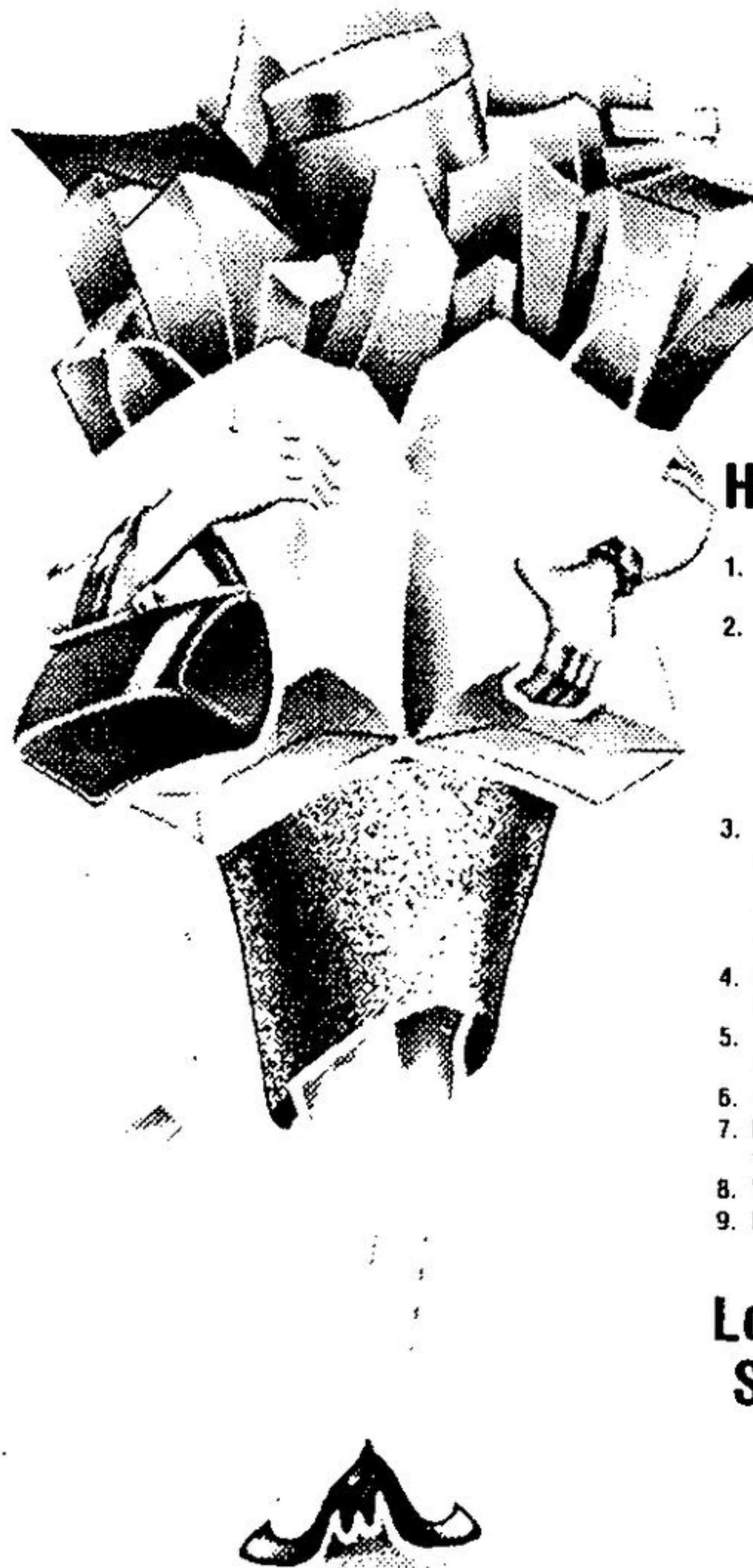
The whole team is also wishing Andy Telford a speedy recovery after breaking his leg in Saturday's house league game.

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
