After a dessert lunch and the official opening, Mae Dixon introduced our guest speaker, Mr. Peter Robertson, Peel Regional Councillor, and Professor of Health at the University of Toronto.

Recently returned from an International Conference on Health in Morocco, Peter showed slides and spoke briefly on his impressions of Morocco - a country of contrasts - on the edge of the Sahara Desert, yet one is able to see the snow on the Atlas Mountains, and is a very short distance from really great surfing on the coast.

He spoke of the reality of the devastation of AIDS. In Zambia, over 70% of the armed forces

have AIDS. They will have to build anew in ten years.

Peter then turned to his work in the schools, and we watched a video prepared for the students of Grades 7, 8 and 9 (the grades where Health Education is compulsory). The film, "Decisions, Decisions," puts the youth student in a setting of teens, music, fashion and chatter, where topics are introduced, regarding sexuality and AIDS, which can be discussed by the teacher and class during appropriate breaks in the presentation. Adults present were impressed by the potential of this visual aid, and in the course of the question period following, learned that guides and other related material is available to develop the topic further.

Alma Doane thanked our speaker, and presented him with a basket of fruit.

Several ladies plan to attend the 88th Area Convention at the Royal York Hotel, where the theme is "The Nineties - a Decade of Challenge". Discussion topics include Health through Plants, Consumer Sense, Drugs - a Risk, and Wills.

After considerable discussion about the difficulty in finding suitable gifts for speakers, birthdays, anniversaries, etc., it was decided that we would limit our speaker's price to \$10. - beyond that the committee would be responsible, we would send a card only for birthdays, anniversaries and other celebrations, and would give a \$10 donation to the Erland Lee Home Memorial Fund on the death of a member.
