The Milton player was also playing for the school's senior volleyball team, which is not allowed by the Halton School Board's Athletic Association.

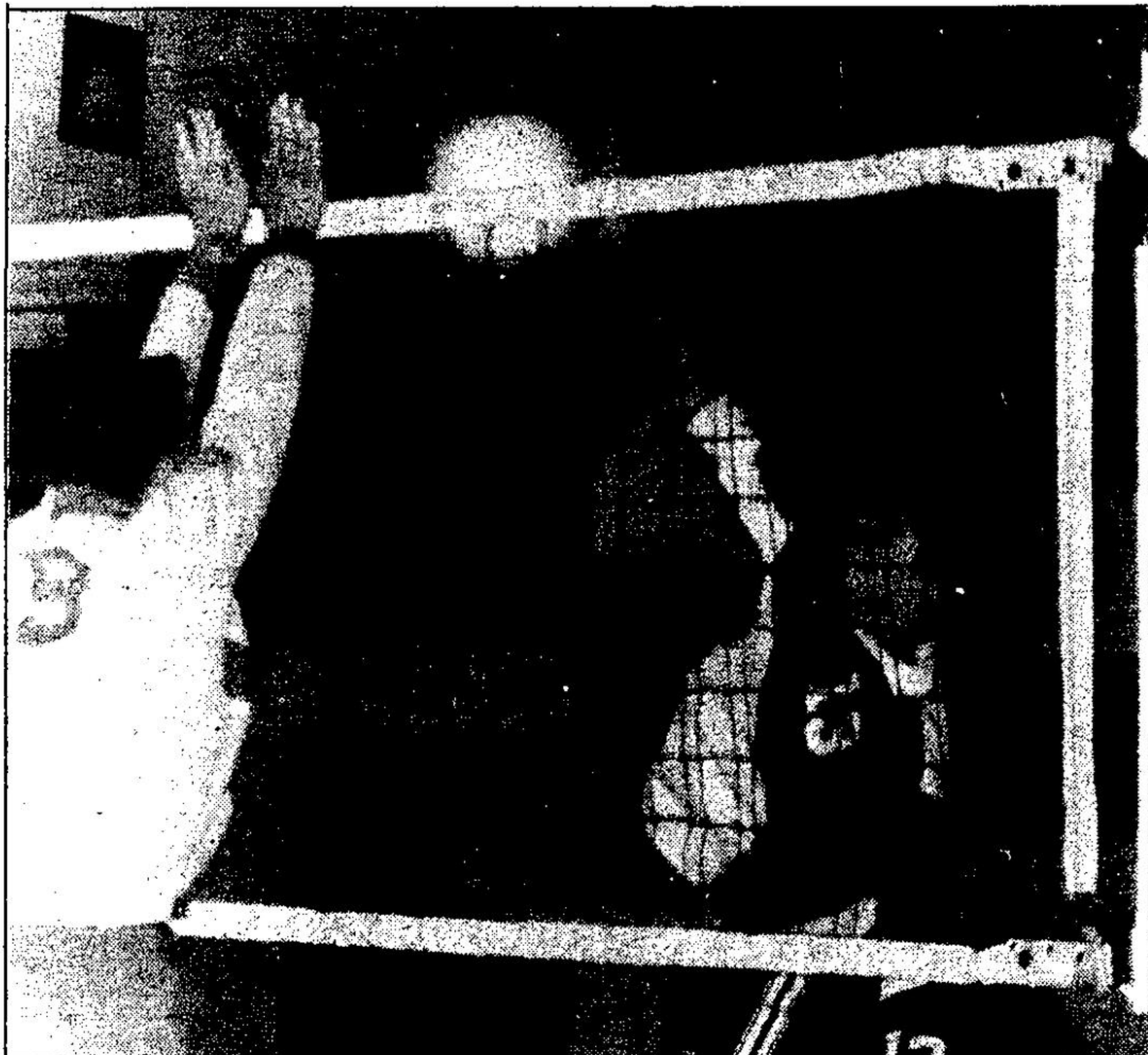
"It's a lot better than having to beat them by more than 14 points, since they would have made the playoffs if we had just beaten them, because our records would have been the same," said Rebel coach Rick Redshaw.

The winner of yesterday's game will play at Burlington Central on Thursday, with the finalists playing Nov. 15 at Ivor Wynne Stadium in Hamilton.

In the last regular season volleyball games on Tuesday, the junior team beat Nelson 2-1 and hosted M. M. Robinson at home on Thursday (after press time) the winner will play at E.C. Drury on Tuesday.

The senior team defeated Acton 15-9, 15-5, 15-6 and finished in second behind M. M. Robinson. The Rebels host the winner of the Pearson and E. C. Drury game on Tuesday.

The senior basketball team beat Acton 50-35 and the juniors lost 47-34 to Nelson. Both teams played Milton on Thursday and the winners will each advance to play at M. M. Robinson on Tuesday.

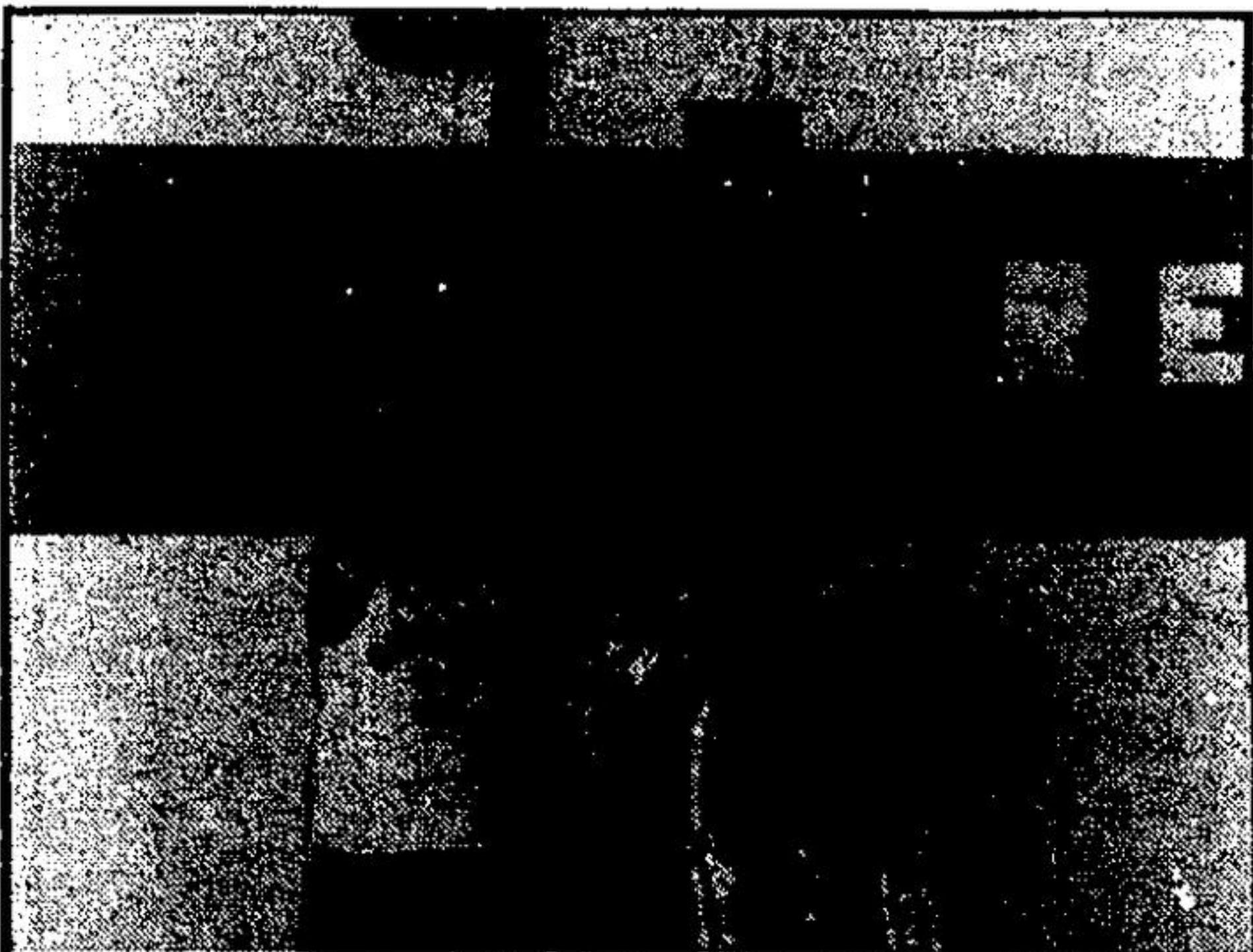
