Business Heating the home with corn

When people think of corn they uusually think of two things; a vegetable that tastes great smothered with butter; or a type of animal feed. But for Acton businessman Lyle Preuter corn is an effiencent and environmentally safe energy source.

Mr. Preuter through his company, Halton Corn Energy Systems, is the distributor in Halton Region for home heaters that run on shelled corn. The American based company Dove Energy Systems manufacturers the heaters. Shelled corn is more commonly known as a type of animal feed.

Since corn is a non-fossil fuel, it is pollutant free, said Mr. Preuter. As well, corn burns 98.8 per cent efficient, he added. Mr. Preuter went on to say compared to other fuels, such as oil and wood, corn is cheaper and is a renewable resource.

The advantage of using a corn heater, however, doesn't stop here. The greater the demand for corn the more revenue farmers can expect, he said.

Mr. Preuter sells three types of corn heaters. The corn stove, which produces 35,000 British Thermal Units (BTU) of heat, the space heater which emits 65,000 BTUs and the corn furnace which produces 100,00 BTUs.

Mr. Preuter started selling corn heaters in September and since then business has been great, he said, noting that on one day alone last week he sold seven.

Most of the heating units have been sold to people in Acton, Milton and Georgetown, but he's planning to turn his sights to the southern part of Halton in the near future.

Initially Mr. Preuter anticipated most of his sales to be in the rural area but urban area residents have also been recep-

tive to the product, he noted. The corn heaters range in price from \$1,995 to \$2,495.

Mr. Preuter predicts the corn heater is only "the tip of the iceberg" in terms of ways corn can be used as a viable energy source.

"There is talk of corn turbines and corn water heaters," he offered.
