W.I. resolution 'The Living Will' was shelved in the Provincial House at the second reading because of intervention by the Right to Life people. The banquet of speaker Rev. Roger McCombe of Inglewood, urged us to look above the thorns and view the roses.

Federated Women's Institute President Peggy Knapp said in her address that W.I. is at a crossroads. After 93 years of good relations, the Ministry of Agriculture and Food is withdrawing it's support of the organization. The organization must not assume, Peggy said. "We have strength, weakness, threats and opportunties." She was certain W.I. could remain visible, viable and vibrant.

The program at this Norval W.I. meeting was International Affairs. Gisela Malchin Introduced Nadine McNutty who gave a very informative presentation with slides and commentary of a trip to Africa where she did volunteer work at a children's centre in Nairobi.

While in Kenya, she studied the Swahili language. Travel was by local buses and living conditions were tense, she said.

Kenya's motto translates to "Pull Together". This country grows tea and coffee. Two game reserve parks Nadine visited were Masai Mara and Amboseli, where she photographed every kind of wild game imaginable.

She spent time with the Masai tribe who wear very colorful costumes and she visited the El Malo tribe who live in unique straw huts by the Jade Sea.


