"We should be able to squeeze in two more, based on the ice that we have available. About 570 adults played this year and even more attended, like wives, their children and friends."

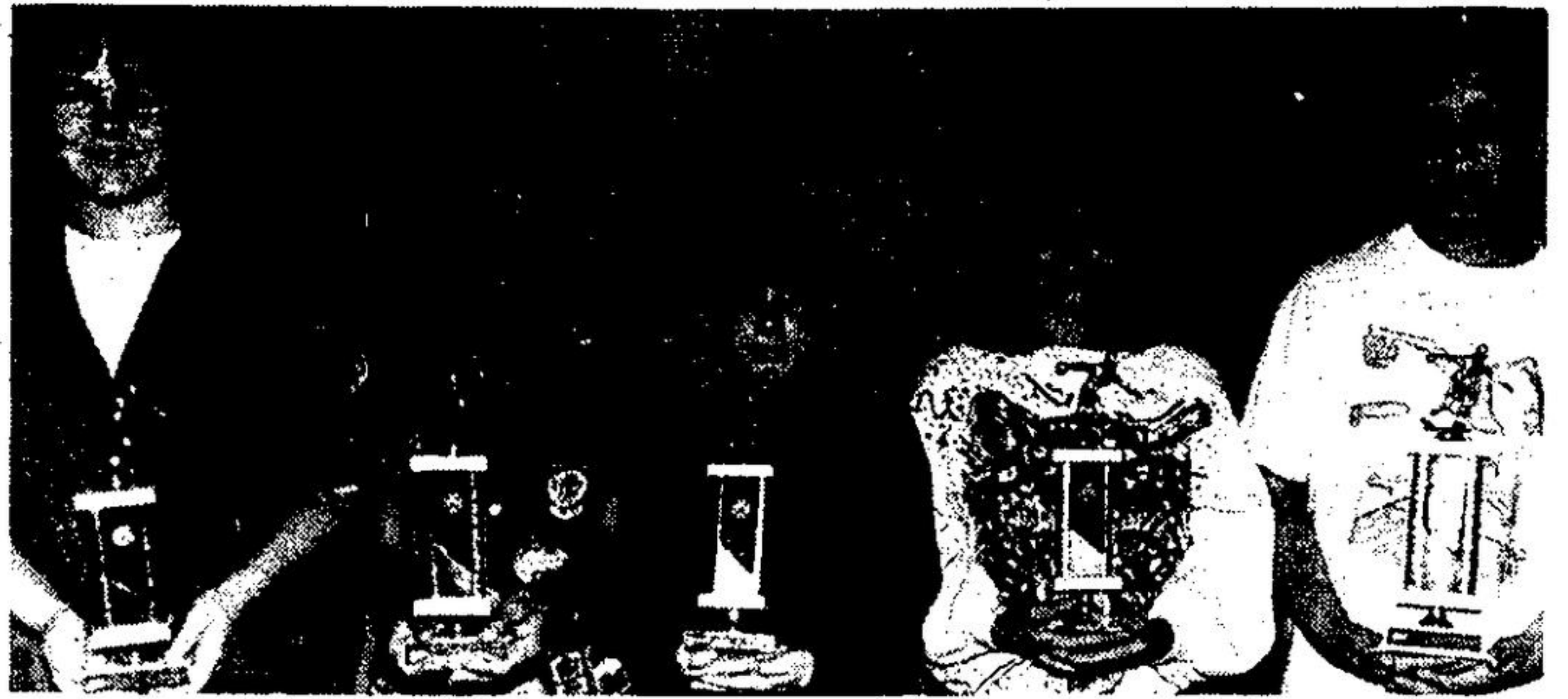

Halton Hills area skating enthusiasts, sports fans and anyone who appreciates artistic and athletic excellence, take note! For the first time the McCair World Cup of Figure Skating will be held in Kitchener, on Dec. 9 at the Kitchener Memorial Auditorium Complex.

The show will provide a display of the artistry and power of 20 of the world's best professional figure skaters, as they compete for \$214,000 in prize money. Four categories are represented in the competition - ladies, men, pairs, and dance. Skaters will be judged on both long and short artistic programs by a jury of internationally-acclaimed judges.

The line-up of competitors includes Canadian sensation Elizabeth Manley, an Olympic Freestyle Champion and Silver Medalist; U.S. National Champion Tiffany Chin; World Cham-

pion and four-time European Champion Alexandre Fadeev, in his professional debut; and perennial Canadian favorites, Barbara Underhill and Paul Martini, five-time World Professional Champions and five-time Canadian National Champions, among others.

The event takes place on Sunday afternoon, Dec. 9 at 3:30 p.m., at the Kitchener Memorial Auditorium Complex. Tickets cost \$20 or \$25, with a \$5 discount for children 12 and under, seniors, and groups of 20 or more.

Special VIP Gold Seats are also available, which include premiere seating at the event and an invitation to the fully-catered Skaters' Reception immediately following the competition.
