Service started for old batteries

A Georgetown auto parts business has started up a new service to help people dispose of their car and truck batteries in a safe and environmentally friend-

Calling the service unique, Bill Smith, of Bill Smith Auto Parts said his store now accepts batteries for recycling. In return, for every battery handed in, a "blue bux" worth a dollar will be given

What's a blue bux, you ask. It's a dollar coupon that can be used towards the purchase of any product sold at the auto parts store, said Mr. Smith.

Mr. Smith is offering the service in conjunction with his store's supplier, Pennsylvannianbased McKerlie Millen. The auto parts store will ship the old batteries to the American company where the acid, lead and plastic will be recovered from the batteries, he explained.

Halton Hills Public Works Superintendent Frank Morette is one person who supports the service.

"The service will benefit the community and the user groups," those who need to dispose of batteries, he said.

Mr. Morette explained how it has been difficult to find storage areas for old batteries, so a service that allows easy disposal was needed. In the past the town has had to wait for scrap dealers to come around and pick up the batteries or transport the batteries to Guelph for disposal, he said.

Mr. Smith's service, will therefore provide the town with financial savings, predicted Mr. Morette.
