The Georgetown Raiders split their weekend home series, winning their second game in a row by defeating Streetsville 9-6 on Friday, but losing 7-5 to Burlington Saturday.

Coach Gary McFadyen said he was disappointed the team didn't get the four points, but there are more positive signs the Raiders are beginning to turn their season around.

"We've won two of our last three games and our new additions are starting to click with the rest of the team. With a little more time together, the scoring should increase even more for

The players McFadyen referred to - Pierre James, John Williamson, Grant Dexter and Bill McDonald have all played a part in the team's success.

"Bill McDonald (who was returned from Burlington when the trade for Andy Pearce fell through) got a hat trick on Saturday and he's gotten some points in every game since he's been back."

Pierre James has been the main force of the team's penalty killing squad, while Williamson and Dexter have been teamed with Marty Savoy as one of the two main powerplay lines. The same line combined on Saturday with Dexter scoring to give the team a 2-1 lead in the first period.

Burlington came back to tie the score with just 1:06 remaining in the opening frame, but the Raiders showed some spark when Rob Doucette's shot from the point was deflected in by McDonald, who was parked at

the side of the net with just 43 seconds left on the clock.

In the second period, a tripping penalty by Adam Hagen enabled the Cougars to tie the score with 11:05 left to play. The visitors went ahead 4-3 at 7:12 when one of their forwards got behind the defence for a breakaway, beating Jason Nicholson low on the glove

The Raiders showed some more powerplay strength with just under two minutes remaining in the period when Duane Lewis took a pass from Plair Catherwood and wristed a shot past the Burlington goalie to tie the score 4-4.

"They scored a quick goal in the first minute of the third and another to make it 6-4, which forced us to try and come from behind late in the game. If we can tighten up defensively more when we get a lead, we'll be in a lot better shape," said McFadyen.

The coach said the overall play of his team has been improving recently, with Friday's game against Streetsville being their best effort of the year so far.

"We were scoring a lot of goals against a team that is in second place. Blair Catherwood got two goals and so did Rob Doucette. McDonald, Williamson and Dexter each got one."

To make room for the new players, the Raiders sent down forward Jim English, who is now playing for the Acton Sabres Jr. C team, and Ken Kosziwka who is now on the Halton AAA Hurricane Midget squad. The Raiders play their next game on Friday in Burlington and then return home to play Brampton on Saturday at 7:30 p.m.

Volleyball Rebels storred at ElAC

The Georgetown District High School Rebels senior volleyball team reached the end of the road on Thursday at the Golden Horseshoe Athletic Conference in Hamilton, losing their semi-final game to Brebeuf.

Rebel coach Bob McKay said his players were a little more disappointed in their play than when they lost the Halton championship to Oakville on Nov. 13.

"The guys knew they didn't play as well as they could have. like they did in Oakville. We weren't getting to our blocks in time and they kept getting shots through them."

McKay gave the Brebeuf team credit, noting that they had a smart veteran team that had also played in GHAC last year. The Rebels won it that time, finishing fifth overall provincially. something he predicted Brebeuf would also do.

The coach is optimistic about the fortunes of the team for next year, since only three players, Mike Bosman, Jim Lawrence and Pete Gombocz will begraduating.

McKay said he'll miss the presence of the tall Gombocz and his court savvy, along with Lawrence's varied abilities. Bosman was recognized for his superior effort by being given the team's player award at the school spirit assembly on Friday.

"He really came on this season and was always at practice helping set up. He had a severe ankle injury last year and has hardly any playing time as a senior. Mike really surpassed all expeclations, being a major part of our team," said McKay.
