# Acton co-op a step closer

An Acton co-operative housing development has moved one step closer to becoming a reality.

The Region's planning and public works committee recommended Wednesday the holding provision on the Cobblehill cooperative proposal be lifted so construction on the 36 affordable housing units could begin before the end of the year. The development is to be located at the end of Cook Street.

The recommendation will go before Regional council this Wednesday.

The development has received all other necessary approvals, including that of the Town of Halton Hills.

As part of the committee's Cobblehill recommendation,

development must pay up to a maximum \$6,000 per unit in extra lot levies for work needed to improve the Prospect Park Well and Acton Water System.

The province has ruled development in Acton can only go ahead when these repairs are done, according to a Regional staff report.

Some committee members questioned if the proponents of the development could afford the \$6,000 per unit. But Regional Chairman Peter Pomeroy told committee members the vince will cover the added expense since the development is a non-profit affordable housing project. The Halton Hills Chamber of Commerce is pleased to be able to host the Fourth Annual Mayor's Christmas Luncheon Dec. 12.


Since its inception, this luncheon has been an overwhelming success enabling the mayor to discuss with the business community the town's accomplishments and future plans.
