Producers a no-show

TORONTO - Maple syrup producers will not be paying fees on maple syrup containers.

In a note conducted recently by the Ontario Ministry of Agriculture and Food on whether producers favored establishing fees on syrup containers, only 20 per cent of eligible voters cast ballots.

Recognizing that this was not a representative sample of Ontario's maple syrup producers, the association and the ministry concluded that there would be no

further action on the proposal.

Of the 1,950 maple syrup producers who received ballots, 378 voted on the Ontario Maple Syrup Producers Association proposal to establish a fee on syrup containers.

Fifty-seven per cent of those who voted were in favor of the fee, which would have been used to provide funds for research, education and advertising for the maple syrup industry and to finance the association.
