10 Years Ago

Charges against a Georgetown resident, Ken Diamond, in connection with the theft of six kilograms of gold, have been withdrawn.

The gold in question, over \$170,000 worth, was en route from Buffalo to London, England, on Sept. 6 when it was found missing. The theft was discovered

when Metro Toronto Police found five of the six kgs. in the possession of a couple who had just been arrested on drug related charges.

Mr. Diamond was working for Air Canada shipping cargo at the time of the theft. "The gold came in as a transfer. I counted the pieces and signed for it when it came in and obviously the police thought I had something to do with the theft, he said.

Mr. Diamond stayed in jail for two-and-a-half days before his parents could raise the \$50,000 bail money.

He appeared in court five times but each time there was insufficient evidence to hold a trial. It was during his fifth appearance in court the Crown Attorney requested the charges be dropped.

Mr. Diamond met with officials from Air Canada and was accepted back to work.
