Streetsville falls to Raider attack

Georgetown Raiders surprised third place Streetsville by striking for four unanswered goals in the second period of their game in Streetsville Tuesday, winning 5-3.

The last two games saw Raiders go into the third period tied. Georgetown woke up against last place Peterborough Dec. 14 to take the win, but allowed top ranked Milton four goals in the final frame, losing 8-4.

"It was a real impressive win for the guys. Streetsville is a good team and we've show we can beat them," said McFadyen.

McFadyen said Nicholson got a lot of action at the end of the game due to the penalties Raiders were taking.

"There were way too many. We were pretty well shorthanded most of the period. I don't know if the referees were trying to even out the score or what, but we seemed to be getting those four minute penalties (while Streetsville got only two minutes)."

McFadyen added that the defence really helped keep the home team off the scoreboard. After Streetsville scored two to make it 5-3, there were 17 minutes left to play, but no more goals were allowed.

Raiders play tonight against Burlington, which they trail by just four points (as of press time Thursday).

Rebel volleyball teams win

Both junior and senior Rebel volleyball teams improved their records to 4-1 with victories at Pearson Wednesday.
