Norval, accompanied by David and Kay Julian of Inglewood, have returned home from a weeks cruise to the Panama Canal and Caribbean, when they flew to Montego Bay, Jamaica.

Here they boarded the 700 ft. Regent Star Liner, with 750 passengers. Beautiful food was enjoyed with about six meals a day. Lots of entertainment, included bingo, horse racing, video games, gambling casinos, pools and church services.

The first port of call was Ochrios, just south and still in Jamaica, when the tour provided great scenery and natural beauty. South again they sailed through the Panama Canal and back again (it took an hour and one-half each way) and were told about the uprising that had just occured there.

The next call was Costa Rica at the south end of Central America and bordering Panama, where their mountains equal our Rockies, but have green trees and shrubs, rather than straight rock. Banana plantations are the main farming where farmers receive only \$2.00 for a cone with 75-100 bananas. They cover the cone with blue plastic to keep the spray and bugs off. The cattle are Brahmas.

A turtle farm was toured on the Cayman Islands. Here turtles were raised and fed for three years. Then later on the bus they noticed a sign for turtle burgers. The island is a British colony, and Georgetown is the capital. They pay no taxes, believe it or not, but they do have 52 different banks.

On the liner back to Jamaica they arrive, only to wait a couple of hours, before flying home to good old Canada.
