Mock emergency

Georgetown Hospital tried a mock emergency with Grade 11 students of GDHS to test facilities and personnel at Georgetown District Memorial Hospital. Students involved thought it was just "like a fire drill," the only difference being that staff of GDHS are not prepared for a fire drill, whereas in this case the staff had to be informed of the mock emergency. The emergency would have been staged as a surprise on the weekend but students were not available.

Bantam girls volleyball club of Georgetown captured the silver medal at the Ontario Championships in Hamilton. The Georgetown team played against teams from Scarborough, Ottawa, Glashan and Waterloo.

Splitting their first two games with Waterloo, Georgetown came back in the second series of games, defeating Glashan only once again splitting their games. From there on it only got worse for the Georgetown team who lost both games to the Titans. In playoff action the Georgetown team got their act together to win enough games to capture the silver medal.

Jesse Hayes was honored as Georgetown's 1989 Citizen of the Year at the Lion's Club March 6 for her long time involvement with foster children, helping the needy and her involvement with the bantam hockey tournament.

During the presentation ceremony Mrs. Hayes received plaques from various levels of government including the town, Region and province.

General Brock High School of Burlington principal Karel Sury, was being hailed as a hero after he calmly dealt with a gunman who had entered the school and shot three students. The gunman was captured by police and taken into custody. Mr. Sury stated there were other teachers who should be called heroes, he added that one teacher was tending to an injured student and telling the gunman to put the gun away, while he was only a few feet away from the gunman.

The teachers and students were given a few days off after the inci-

dent to collect themselves and discuss their feelings about the shootings. No students were killed in the incident.

Acton Sabres number one player, Jeff Shevalier, was voted the 1989-90 Mid-Ontario Junior C rookie of the year.

The new Rookie of the Year led the Sabres in scoring last season with 30 goals and 34 assists for 64 points. After the Sabres season had been ended by the Caledon Flyers, Shevalier was called up to Junior B to play for the Georgetown Raiders in a best-of-seven game series against the Streetsville Derbys.

In took Streetsville six games to finally eliminate the Raiders from play.

Twenty-five people were arrested and charged on drug-related offences following a three-month investigation by police.

Charges included; possession of narcotics for the purpose of trafficking, conspiracy to traffic narcotics, trafficking narcotics, possession of stolen property, and break and enter.
