The combination of a convincing win over the Challengers in regular action Dec. 20 and a make-up game drubbing of the mighty JAWS has elevated the white and blue representing Work That Body into first overall.

Heading into play, the Fit-As-A-Fiddles were well aware that the right set of circumstances could lead to this outcome. They were ready, and they even had their sponsor and number one fan Laurie Burns out to watch. Taking seven of the game's eight ends, the WTBers closed with an 8-1 count over the Barber rink.

Ensuring that first place vault was the 10-4 loss by Dunlop Insurance Rockers to Kendale Eight Enders. The Dunlop squad was minus its third, Ted Rom-bough, and its juggled line-up, including spare Rob Crichton on the ice for the first time this year, was off-balance most of the contest.

Adding to the troubles of the Rocker foursome were precise deliveries by the Eight Enders' front end, Shannon Jackson and Rob Schewell.

JAWS captured a win over The Senators in a close and interesting game. The Senators took the early lead 3-0 after two ends. But Dave Ashbee, back from Hawaii (though his mates weren't sure in the early going that his return was such a good thing to have been bestowed upon them), brought his team back.

The critical turning point was Ashbee's sixth end takeout with that end's last rock. That play seemed to turn up the confidence of the other JAWS members, and they went on to win 7-5.

Another particularly interesting match took place between the Bill Smith Auto Wingnuts and Lopers' Swimmers. The Wingnut rink looked as if it had this game in hand after six ends were completed, leading 5-2 at the time. But as all curlers know, lots can happen as ice conditions refine over the course of a game, and in this game lots did.

With two rocks to be thrown, one for each side, the Swimmers were sitting with two counters in the four foot ring. Ken McCormack decided to guard his counters, but his shot picked up something before it got to the hog line and veered out of play.

With opportunity staring at him and a two point lead, Brad Smith needed to eliminate just one of those counters or cradle between them to take the victory. Such was not to be the case. His last shot stone slipped through the house and hard luck Smitty had

to settle for a tie.

The remainder of the games played ended up with one rink dominating the other. Kendale Hackers, with nearly perfect play from their lead Jim Annett, coasted to an 11-2 win over The Norval Boys.

La Guys (without La Goddess on the ice) had some big ends, one a huge five pointer, and bettered the Dead Enders 13-5. The Sign Shoppe Sliders, with 17-year-old Adam Hiltz substituting for his father, overturned the Automatons 8-2. Adam showed his high school curling elective in physical education and left him looking right at home on the ice.

The Hog Liners stayed in the thick of things with a 16-4 trouncing of the Boxers. They had big ends and lots of them, but in spite of the outcome, The Boxers' Naomi Patterson wanted to focus on the few good shots made by herself and her teammates.

Fishing regulation changes

Attention Halton Hills fishing enthusiasts! The 1991 fishing regulations have been changed to allow year-round fishing for rainbow and brook trout on the Credit River between the Dundas Street bridge at Erindale Park and the

Burnhamthorpe Road bridge beginning January 1, 1991.

In the past, the Ministry of Natural Resources has limited fishing for trout along the river above the Dundas Street bridge during certain periods of time.

"Fishing licenses will also remain the same for the next year with an \$11.50 fee for a annual license and \$6.50 for a 40 day tag," says Robert Peace, C.V.C.A. Community Relations spokesperson.

"It should be a great spring for trout fishing however we would ask anglers who happen to catch any Pacific Salmon next year to release them since the Pacific program is still in its early stages and we need them to reproduce," said Peace.

In cooperation with the Ministry of Natural Resources, the Credit Valley Conservation Authority continues to work year-round to improve fish habitat along the Credit River.

"We would like to offer thanks to the Credit River Anglers Association for all their work cleaning up much of the fish debris left along the banks of the river," says Peace.

Remember - catch your limit, but limit your catch - practice catch and release.
