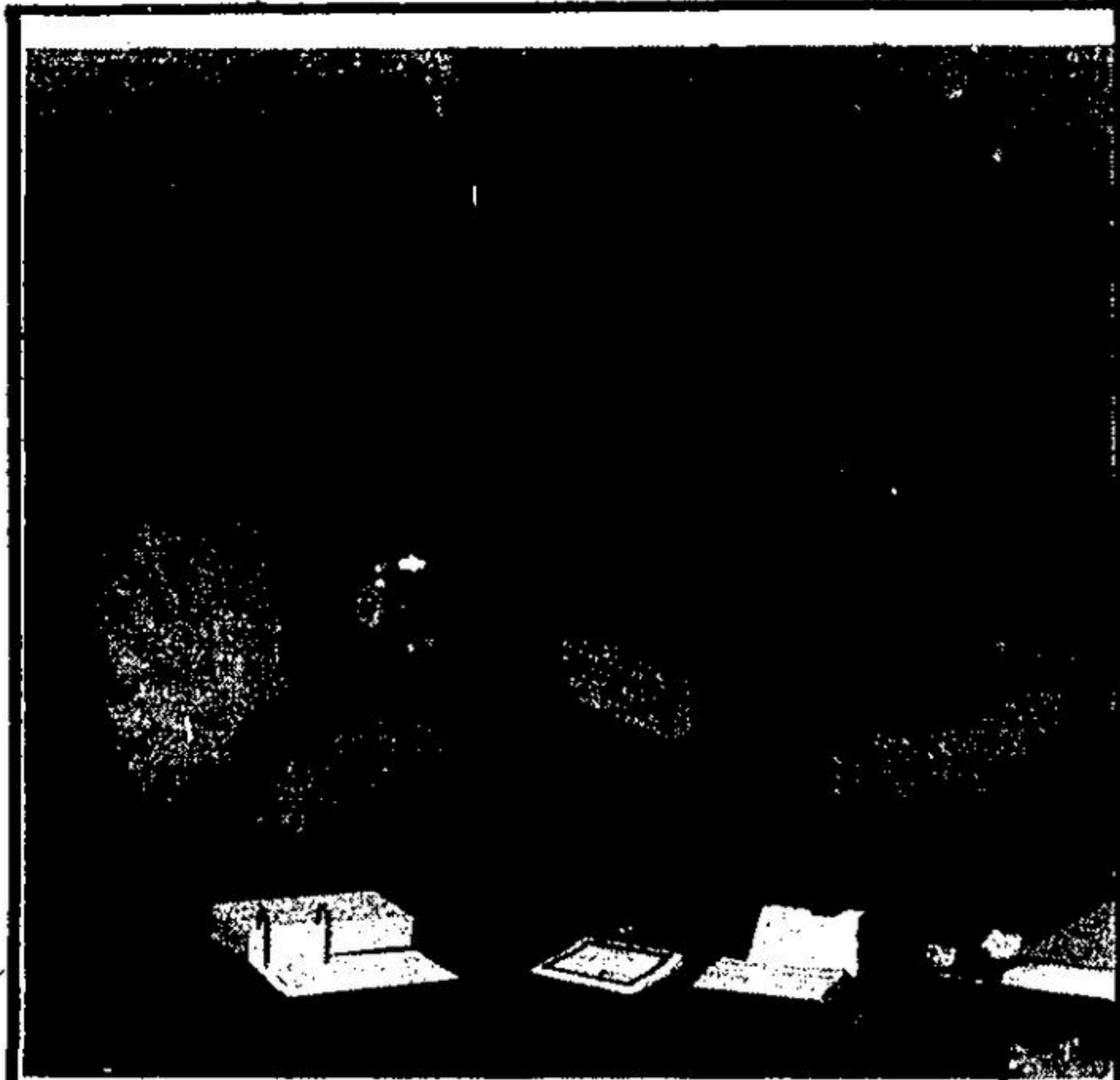

Conservation authority looking to fund five new projects

The Credit Valley Conservation Authority may now be able to fund five projects this year it originally thought impossible.

CVCA Acting General Manager Ken Owen said Friday the authority may obtain funds through the province's new Capital Funding Economic Stimulus Program.

If obtained, the money would be used to finance the following projects:

- Resource Inventory and Integration - or the taking stock of environmentally sensitive areas under CVCA jurisdiction.

- Fill-line mapping - the act of mapping those lands under CVCA jurisdiction.

- The Credit Valley Trail study - a feasibility study of expanding the Credit Valley Trail from Mississauga through Halton Hills to Orangeville.

- More tree planting along the Credit River.

- Conservation Stewardship Planning - informing property owners along the Credit how to manage their property wisely.

Mr. Owen said the projects may be funded under the new program because as far as the CVCA is concerned they meet the provincially-set criteria. In other words, they can be initiated within the next six months, they are labor intensive.

Mr. Owen, however, was unable to say when the authority would know one way or another if the provincial money will be forthcoming.

The combined cost of the programs is just over \$254,000, according to a CVCA report. The CVCA wants close to \$140,000 from the province to go ahead with the projects, the report indicates. The remaining sum will come from the conservation authority's general levy.

Mr. Owen explained the expected 1991 regular provincial funding won't be enough to cover these projects. In the past years the province has only increased its funding to the province's authorities by approximately

four per cent or a little less than the rate of inflation.

The amount each authority in Ontario receives yearly from the province to fund particular projects is based on the relative importance of each project in comparison to other projects proposed by the various conservation authorities.

Mr. Owen predicted none of the five CVCA projects would be deemed a high enough priority by the province to receive "regular" provincial funding this year.

Chocolate company sold

The sale of Georgetown's All Bake Confection Limited, located on Ontario Street, to one of the largest chocolate manufacturers in the United States will mean several new jobs for local residents.

Milwaukee-based Ambrosia Chocolate bought All Bake over the New Year holidays and the company's Vice-President of Sales, Tom Miller, said Monday there are plans to expand current production levels from 15 million pounds a year to approximately 40 million pounds a year.

"More people will be hired because of the increase of production," said Mr. Miller, but he was unable to provide an exact figure.

Like its parent company, the Georgetown company is now called Ambrosia Chocolate. Ambrosia, which is a division of the W. R. Grace Corporation is one of the largest manufacturers of chocolate in the United States, said Mr. Miller.

The Georgetown plant will primarily produce chocolate chips, he said. Ambrosia bought the Georgetown plant because sugar is cheaper in Canada, explained Mr. Miller. The plan calls for the expansion of the Georgetown company and the scaling down of the Milwaukee operation, said Mr. Miller.

"That's a switch," he added, referring to the public's belief that most of the time American companies move their Canadian operations out of the country instead of the other way around.

The Georgetown operation was previously owned by the Miller family of Georgetown, said Mr. Miller. His family will still be involved with the company during the transition phase.

Mr. Miller said the deal had been in the works for six months. He wouldn't reveal the sale price.

Ambrosia has "absolutely" no plans to move the plant out of Georgetown, Mr. Miller assured.

He couldn't give an exact date when the plant expansion would happen but said it would go ahead soon.

The Georgetown plant ships chocolate to customers in both Canada and the United States.

The agenda will be posted by 9:00 a.m. the day of the meeting in the Administrative Offices.

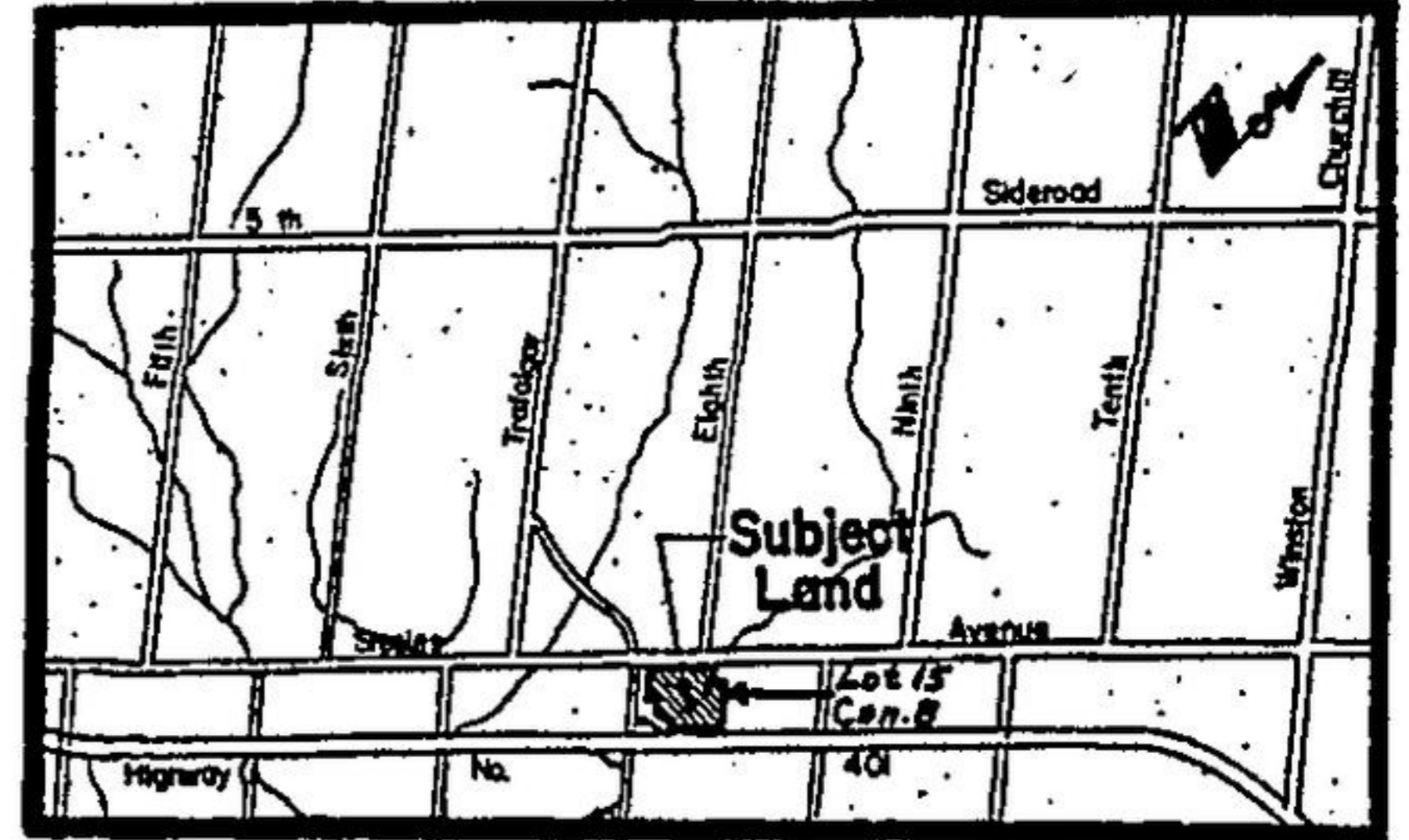

The Corporation of the Town of Halton Hills will be considering appointments to the Boards and Committees outlined below. ACTIVAN ADVISORY COMMITTEE

One (1) member is needed to serve on this Committee for a three-year term. The Committee advises Council on the designation of buildings of historic and architectural interest under the Ontario Heritage Act.
