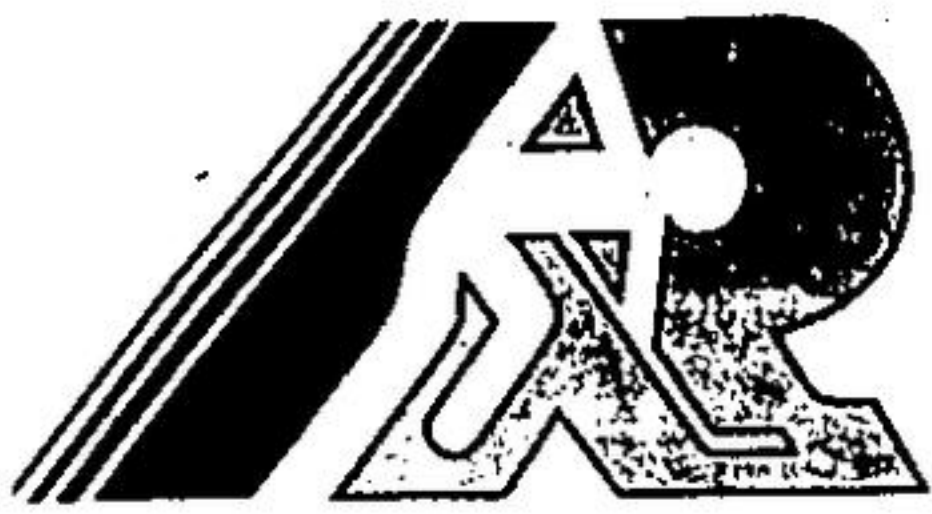


Raiders topple first place Milton 7-4

Georgetown Raiders surprised first place Milton at Alcott Arena Saturday, defeating the visitors 7-4. Raiders also broke a four game losing streak with the win.

Coach Gary McFadyen said the victory showed how closely the teams are matched in the junior B division this season.

"Basically, any team can beat

any other on any particular night. With the new players we've got, the team has got an even better chance of advancing in the playoffs."

The two most recent additions to the team, Cory Ames and goaltender Jason Sirota, both played a part in Saturday's success.

Sirota was brought in from Brampton's junior team and stood between the pipes for Raiders. Ames scored a goal and was a powerhouse on the ice, according to McFadyen.

"He really inspired some of our other players. He was digging in the corners, coming back on the play and checking very well. He played his heart out."

To make room for netminder Sirota, Paul St. Pierre was released from Raiders. No other moves have been made, but McFadyen said the team has one Jr. B card and one Jr. C card left to fill before the deadline in February.

"We'll be looking at a few more players Tuesday (yesterday) at our practice and see what we have. Getting another goal scorer is pretty much what we're looking for now."

McFadyen added that Ames, who had played earlier this season with Streetsville, worked well on the line with Marty Savoy and John Williamson and may see further action together.

The coach also praised the ef-

forts of his penalty killing units, which he said helped keep Milton off the scoreboard.

"We had a number of penalties in the second period and for a while we were three on five. They scored one with five seconds left in a double minor, but that was all they allowed. Savoy and (Pierre) James did an especially good job out there."

Raiders had started out with a 2-0 lead, but fell behind 4-2 in the second period. The home team came back in the third, tying the match up 4-4 with six minutes remaining.

"The guys really came back, not letting up right to the end of the game (scoring three more goals). Billy McDonald had a great night, getting a hat trick."

Also scoring for Raiders were

Scott Humber, Duane Lewis, and Blair Catherwood. Raider's Rob Doucette played in Sunday's Central Ontario Junior B All-Star game, assisting on two goals in a 7-4 loss to the East division team.

Raiders visit Milton Friday for a rematch and then play Saturday at home against Oakville, starting at 7:30 p.m.

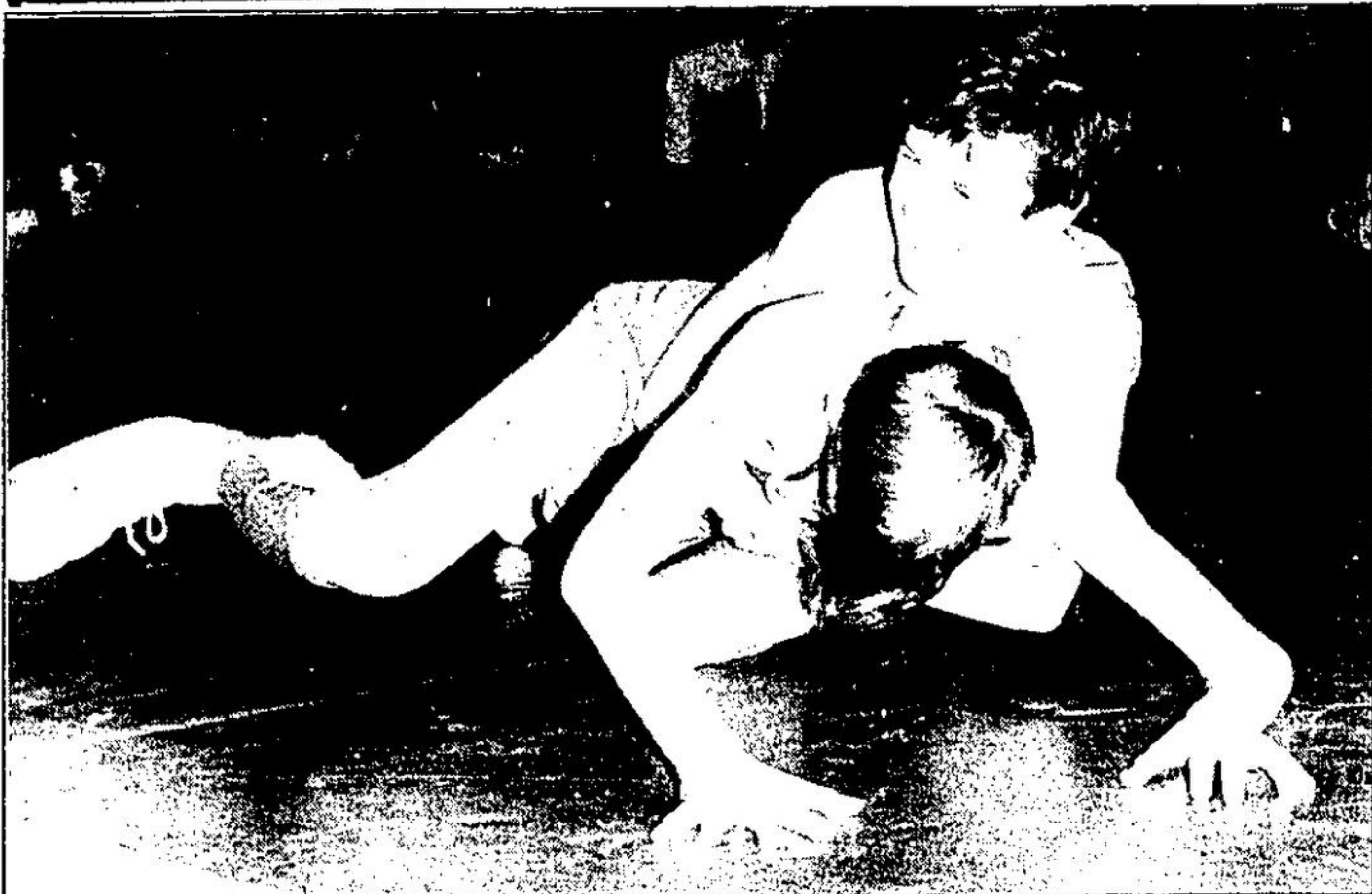

Leading the way for Rebels were Kyle Goodlet, Colin Kay, Steve Brown and Dustin Thompson, all with first place finishes.

In second were Sean Goodwill, Ian Cox, Bruce Ryan, Mike Large and Mike Roe. Steve Teetzl placed third, while Derek Mills and Damien Stewart-Hagge finished fourth.

Hall pointed out that organizing the event required a lot of effort for a number of people, in particular Ryan Robinson and Heather Santsche, who were conveners of the tournament as part of their physical education course requirement.

"It took a lot of work and coordinating to make sure everything ran smoothly. They both did a

great job. Mrs. Wiese, Mr. McKay and Mr. Castledine were very helpful as well."

Hall also thanked Ray Smith, Art and Bob Sweezie, Hilary Wiese, Stephanie Perkins and Cindy Wiese for their assistance.

Friday, Sabres defeated Grand Valley 9-6 at Acton, their second win over Harvesters in a row, having beaten them Jan. 6 on the road.

Paul Larsen led the Sabre attack with a hat trick, while Jeff Shevalier was close behind with two. Jamie Curran, John Van Dam, Jason Lucas and Mark Brommersma each had one.

Sabre coach Ken Steen said this year is another step in the improvement of the organization, which he said he hopes will result in a first round bye in the playoffs.

"We started building this team up from three years ago and now the work has started paying off. All the players have been working hard to make it happen."

Saturday, Sabres hosted Alliston, thrashing Hornets 10-1. Shevalier, Jim English and Phil

Fraser each notched two goals. Paul Larsen, Jamie Curran, Mark Brommersma and Jason Lucas each had one.

Steen added that the team is sitting in a good position after defeating Bulls, since a third place finish would see the team play last place Fergus in the opening playoff round.
