Bikes mean freedom to youngsters

What does a bicycle mean to a child? A bike can mean freedom, the opportunity to visit friends and places that might otherwise be inaccessible, a way to fit in when "all the other kids have bikes." At Halton Children's Aid Society, bikes are one of the most common "extras" requested by children in care. Unfortunately, financial restraints often mean that these requests cannot be filled.

Curt Gwisdek and Mauro Orlandi of Cycle Path bikes in Oakville know how important a bike can be to a child, especially one without too many material

possessions. They organized an ambitious campaign to collect donated bikes from their customers to give to children in need at Christmas.

"The response was phenomenal - we got over 120 bikes," Gwisdek says, "but some of them were just junk. We were able to salvage parts from most of them, though, and put together about forty good, working bikes."

Gwisdek and Orlandi worked with Alexander Manson and other members of the Oakville Cycling Club to repair and clean up the bikes, then offered them to Big Brothers, Big Sisters and the Halton Children's Aid Society.

CAS Social Worker Don Neill says: "I was very impressed by

what they had done. They had obviously put a lot of work into getting these bikes into condition, and it's been very exciting for the kids who got them."

Supervisor Marilyn Medjuck comments: "Another aspect that we think was very important is the terrific treatment that the kids were given when they went over to choose their bikes. The Cycle Path staff were generous with their time and genuinely eager to help them."

Gwisdek hopes to make this an on-going project, thanks to the enthusiasm of everyone involved.

AGE OF ADMISSION AND REQUIREMENTS

Junior Kindergarten

Children are required to be 4 years of age on or before December 31, 1991.

Senior Kindergarten

Children are required to be 5 years of age on or before December 31, 1991.

- Birth and Baptismal Certificate required for age verification.
- Before registration is finalized, a child will have completed the prescribed program of immunization for diphtheria, tetanus, poliomyelitis, measles, mumps and rubella.
- Families registering for the first time at a school are requested to provide each child's Health Card number at the time of registration.
