Coach Ken Steen said he wasn't sure how Schomberg did in its other weekend games, but after the defeat, Acton stood five points back.

"Since we won our other two games, we should still be in good shape. It's too bad we lost to Schomberg though. Two mistakes cost us a couple of goals and it might have turned out differently that night."

Acton sniper Jeff Shevalier

continued to find the net, scoring two goals against Schomberg, followed by Jamie Curran with one and Craig Kerfoot with the other.

Friday's game at home marked the return of Craig Cullen to the Sabre scoring sheet. Cullen, signed Wednesday, was the

highest leading scorer for Sabres when he left the team to play Jr. A hockey in Western Canada last year. He is one of the main people Steen hopes will help the team in the playoffs.

"He definitely can score goals for us. When he left the team last year, he had 18 goals and 18 assists after just 19 games."

Sabre president Mitch Lajeunesse echoed the sentiments
of Steen, emphasizing that more
scoring is needed in order to
match the offensive output of
league-leading Orangeville
Crushers, which Acton hosts
Saturday.

"We have to beat Orangeville to show our guys that we can take the championship. Since we haven't beat them yet this season, and we're trying to get ahead of Schomberg, this game coming up is important."

Lajeunesse said one thing that is puzzling him is the absence of

spectators when the team is doing so well recently.

"It's really too bad seeing less than 100 people in the stands. This is the best team Acton has had in quite a few years and the players aren't getting much support at home. I see more people watching when the Novice team plays."

At home Friday, Sabres defeated Goderich 7-5, highlighted by an extra effort from Adam Hilts, who scored while the Sabres had two men in the penalty box.

Also scoring for Sabres were Kerfoot, Shevalier, Jim English, Paul Larsen and Jesse Naden.

Sunday's game against Wingham featured shutout goaltending from Greg Powell, who Steen credited with sparking a 7-0 performance from his scoring lines.

"He really kept the door closed on them in the first period. After that, we just seemed to take over the momentum of the game."

Curran had another good night, earning a hat trick, while English, Hilts, Phil Fraser and Jason Lucas each had one goal. Also contributing to the effort was defencemen Jason Sawyer, who was the last import player to be signed by the team.

Weekend scoring assault subdues Raider defence





McFadyen said the first period with Milton was close and could have been 3-2 if the puck had bounced Raiders way a few times.

Though the team was missing a few players due to injuries, (Scott Humber - knee, Pierre James - strained ligaments, Grant Dexter - shoulder) the coach said that wasn't really an excuse for how the team performed.

"The intensity of play and the work effort just wasn't there. I thought we were terrible defensively as a team. A few guys were out, but in the crunch you have to be able to tighten up about two lines."

Raider's two newest' aquisitions, netminder Jason Sirota and forward Corey Ames played against Milton, with Ames notching the first of his team's two goals. Rob Doucette had a good outing, assisting on Ames and scoring the second goal.

McFadyen said both goaltenders played well, stopping 37 shots during Saturday's game, but didn't get much help in their own zone from either the defencemen or forwards.

"There are a few players who really worked out there. John Williamson played very well this weekend, just as he's done for most of the season. Even when we were down by several goals, he gave 100 per cent."

McFadyen said Raiders will be looking at a few more potential additions to the team at their practices this week as they look to fill their two remaining cards. Raiders play Burlington on the road Friday, returning home to play Streetsville Saturday.
