# Acton meets Fergus in first playoff round

Acton Sabres defeated Fergus 7-1 Friday on the road in what wound up as a warm-up game for the playoffs.

Due to Schomberg securing second place on the weekend, Sabres were scheduled to begin the first round of post-season play yesterday (Tuesday) at Fergus, which finished in sixth place.

This year, the two top junior teams (Orangeville and Schomberg) got a first round bye. Acton finished third, earning the right to play the basement dwelling Fergus team. Sabre coach Ken Steen explained why the team played the first game on the road instead of at Acton (results unavailable at press time).

"We have a tight schedule and we couldn't get ice time at Acton soon enough. We'll be playing at home on Wednesday (tonight at

7:30 p.m.) and Friday (at 8:00 p.m.). The fourth game will be at Fergus on Sunday (at 2:00 p.m.)."

Steen said the team started out a bit slow against Fergus after scoring their first two goals in the opening period.

"The guys kind of figured it would be no problem to win. After Fergus scored (to make it 3-1) in the second, we picked things up more."

Assistant captain Jamie Curran scored the first goal just 27 seconds into the game. Paul Larsen followed that goal up with a shorthanded effort at 4:38 to make the score 2-0.

Curran scored the second shorthanded goal of the evening for Sabres at 6:37 of the middle

frame, earning his second goal of the evening. After Fergus scored at 10:43, Acton tightened up to end the period 3-1.

Jeff Shevalier, who has been filling opponent's nets with pucks since he joined Sabres, scored the first of his two markers 40 seconds into the third period to get the team moving.

Steen said one of the reasons for the lethargic start was the absence of a few players who play a large role in Sabres game plan.

"Adam Hilts is hurting, along with Mark Brommersma. John Van Dam was serving a suspension for fighting in the Orangeville game. Van Dam will be back for Wednesday, while Brommersma should be ready

Friday."

Steen would not specify the injuries Hilts and Brommersma have suffered and was unsure when Hilts would be able to return to the lineup. The coach said one new face is likely to be seen on the bench in the near future, but said he wouldn't release details until the Fergus series had gotten underway.

Other scorers for Acton included Rob Boyle at 2:13 of the third, followed by Shevalier with his second marker just under two minutes later. Rich Bond got the final goal at 12:16.

Both goaltenders, Greg Powell and Jim Mantione played in the game, with Powell starting and Mantione coming in halfway through the match.

Orangeville came back at the 11:36 mark to tie the game.


Pearce had made the save, but fell back in the net with the puck and Orangeville was awarded a
