See-saw fight for first

The see-saw battle for first place in Industrial Curling play continues at Georgetown's North Halton curling rink as the schedule of games for the league's first draw is winding down.

Dunlop Insurance Rockers and Work That Body Fit-As-A-Fiddle, the two leading rinks, squared off on Jan. 31 with a mere half point margin between them.

The Rockers started strong. Midway through the game, they had a 4-0 lead - a lead built with steals in the third and fourth ends. But the table turned at that juncture.

The Fit-As-A-Fiddle skip Ken Irwin's picked up his shot making and coincidentally the Rockers' skip Barry Dunlop lost his. The WTBers took ends five through eight, highlighted by Irwin's final shot that perfectly cradled behind cover in the twelve foot.

Electing to draw for the win, the Rockers' Dunlop released the game's last rock inside and it followed the path of the WTB stone. The shot finished by crossing over the face of Irwin's counter, leaving the latter as shot rock.

The Fit-As-A-Fiddle crew were ecstatic at the turnaround and the outcome, a 5-4 win for them and a return to first place.

Quietly moving into second place by half a point as a consequence of their win and the Dunlop loss were the Hog Liners. Skipped again by Ian MacLeod, who is looking more and more comfortable in the general's position, the Hog Liners edged past Al Moore's Sign Shoppe Sliders with an 8-6 score.

The post game discussions, aside from the standing's changes as a result of the games played involving the top three rinks, were about the events on Sheet One in the late draw. In the game played there, Tom Reed's La Guys were up against Dave Dunlop's Norval Boys.

La Guys established a seemingly healthy and comfortable 5-0 lead after the first four ends of play. But the fifth end proved to

be a shocker. The Norval Boys all of a sudden woke up, got 'hot, hot, hot', and crafted seven points in the fifth - the biggest single end score of the season in the league.

The Reed rink was rattled by the turn of events and proceeded to lose the next two ends as well. The final was a 12-6 trouncing and the direction for both of these teams shows signs of changing.

The winds of change were also evident in another contest. Brad Smith seems to be finally getting his game together. He took his Wingnut bunch up the ladder with an impressive 6-3 triumph over the once mighty JAWS. With two in the second and another pair in the third, the Smith rink was ahead to stay.

Deadlocks were the final outcomes in a pair of this week's early games. A parachute squad of spares carrying The Automatons banner came back with a deuce in the eighth end to tie The Boxers under Sam Papaleo at 5-5.

In the other game, Ken McCormack of Lopers' Swimmers with makeshift crew held Graham Farnell's Senators to a 3-3 dead heat after having an early 3-0 lead.

In other games, the two Kendale Mechanical rinks were victors. The Eight Ender version took on the Challengers. They closed with a convincing 9-3 score and six ends in the bank.

The Hackers version came up against The Dead Enders, the latter with John Gibson back after surgery induced layoff. Don Campbell took his foursome down victory lane by a 7-3 count.
