Tires stolen

Community— Regional council approves Halton AIDS centre

Halton Region will soon get a storefront Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome, (AIDS), Information and Counselling Centre

Regional Council approved Wednesday that Halton's Health Department enter into negotiations with the group Hamilton AIDS Network for Dialogue and Support, (HANDS), to establish the storefront operation in Burlington.

Although located in Halton south it will service residents throughout the Region, said Halton Commissioner and Medical Officer of Health, Dr. Robert Nosal, following the council meeting.

Council made its decision after Dr. Nosai told councillors the number of individuals with Human Immunedeficiency Virus, (HIV), including AIDS continues to rise in Halton. There was a 27 percent increase in reported HIV cases over the past year, said Dr. Nosal. Males between the ages of 30 and 50 comprise the majority

of HIV carriers, said Dr. Nosal, but 12 percent of the cases involve individuals under the age of 25, he said.

The storefront location will allow young people or other interested adults to informally obtain education materials or discuss any particular issue regarding AIDS, said Dr. Nosal.

The Medical Officer told council HANDS' Hamilton office has been serving that city and Halton.

Education is the main way to prevent the spread of AIDS, said Dr. Nosal. That's why he recommended council support establishing the storefront operation as a pilot project. It will be open three afternoons a week and staffed-by the HANDS group and members of the Regional Health Department AIDS project staff, explained Dr. Nosal.

Halton's Health Department already operates the Healthy Relationships Campaign to educate Halton's young people about ways of preventing the

spread of AIDS. Dr. Nosal anticipates the HANDS operation will complement the existing program.

Break and enter charges

Two Georgetown men and one Brampton man were arrested Jan. 30 by Halton Regional Police in connection with several break and enters in Georgetown.

Members of Halton's task force were investigating the break-ins which resulted in the arrest of 21-year-old Joseph Johnston of Georgetown, 23-year-old Gregory Kuipers of Georgetown and 21-yearold Michael Hayes of Bramalea.

The three accused have been charged with a total of 14 criminal offences which include break, enter and theft, possession of stolen property, possession of a prohibited weapon (a switchblade knife) and possession of narcotics.

During the investigation, which involved break-ins at Georgetown District High School Jan. 11 and Jan. 15, the Maple Auto Service Centre Jan. 20 and Jug City Jan. 23, police executed two search warrants in Georgetown and were able to recover approximately \$3,000 in stolen property. Property included cigarettes, a guitar, a VCR, television and some flags.

All charged will appear in Milton Court on Feb. 18, 1991.


