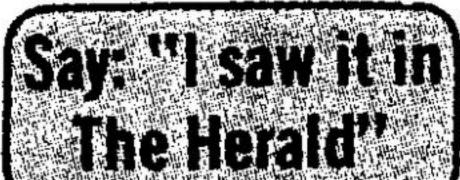

Snowmobiling and booze don't mix

When out snowmobiling, people face a few natural risks; the cold, thin ice and hazards such as snow drifts and trees on the path. But, the biggest hazard is one the snowmobiler can control, say the Royal Life Saving Society of Canada (RLSSC). It's drinking while snowmobiling.

Alcohol affects a person's balance and judgement. A moment of dizziness or a misstep may not cause harm on the ground or in a restaurant, but it can spell disaster on a snowmobile.

If that's not enough warning, you should know that impaired snowmobiling is just as serious as impaired driving. The penalty on a first offence is a minimum fine of \$300. For a second offence there is imprisonment for not less than 14 days.

For the third and each subsequent offence, there is imprisonment for not less than 90 days. In addition, you may be prohited from operating a snowmobile for a minimum of three months and could also lose your driver's license.

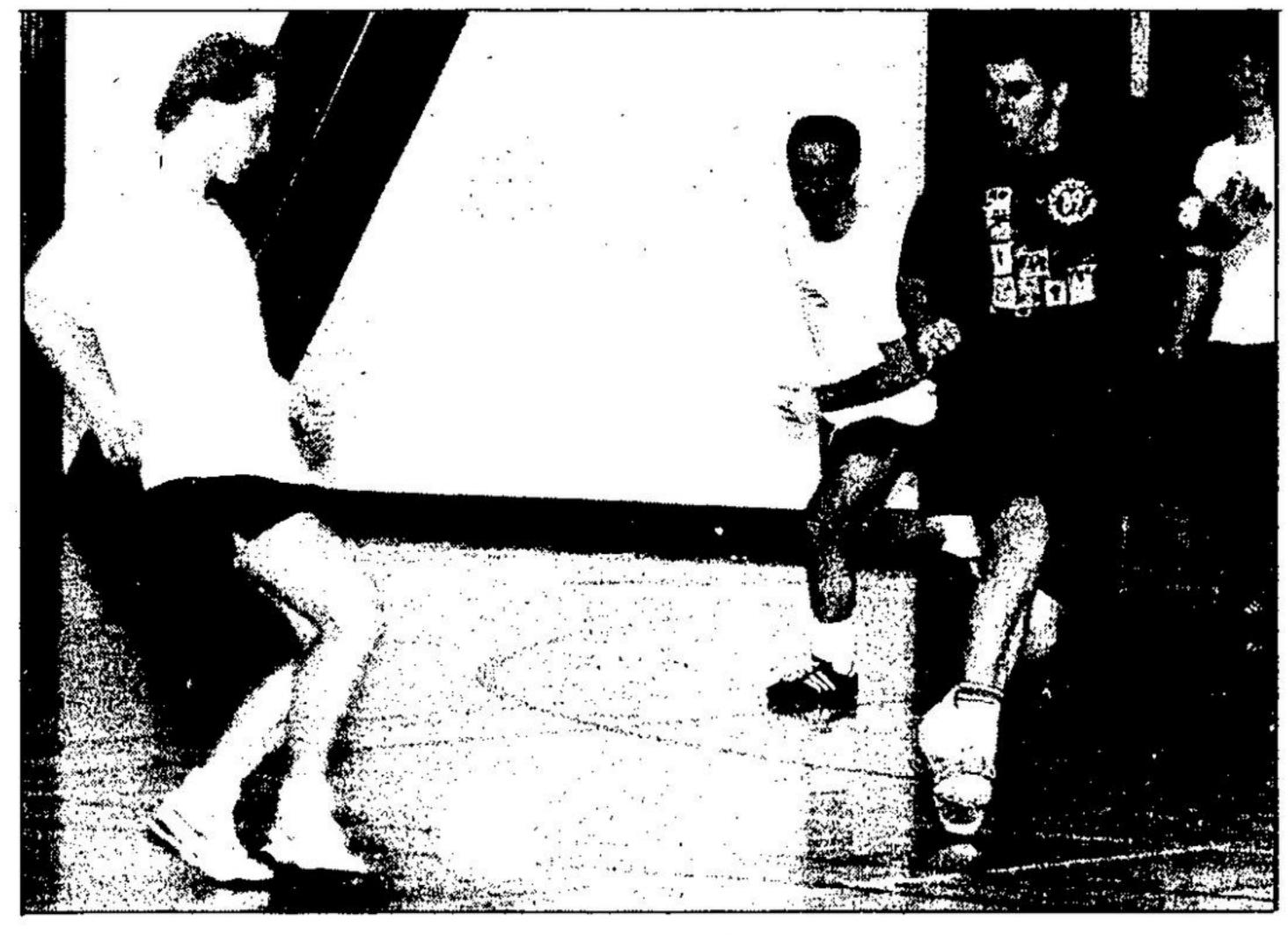

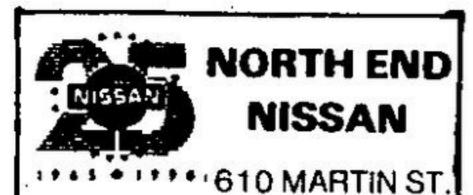
Soccer club
