Residence break-in

Halton Regional Police report a rural Georgetown residence was broken into and entered by unknown thieves between 7:30 a.m., on Friday and 5:30 p.m. Saturday. Police say the culprits gained entry via the front door by using some sort of tool to force the door, locked by a deadbolt, away from the frame. Once inside, the thieves travelled through the master bedroom, living room and dining room, removing jewellery, a large wall clock and a silver tea service. Numerous valuable items were left untouched, say the police, who aren't sure how many other items may have been stolen since the owners of the house are away on vacation. The owners son, who checks the house daily, reported the break-in. Police were able to find an outline of a footprint revealing a size seven shoesize. Police are continuing their investigation.

Youth charged

A Georgetown young offender has been charged with drinking under age and being intoxicated in a public place after he was arrested at a Georgetown District High School dance Friday night. Police were at the event when they noticed a fight between two males. When they arrested one of the males, they found he was in an intoxicated state. Police handcuffed the youth and say he was uncooperative from the time of arrest. The boy refused to be released into his stepfather's custody so police brought him to 11 Division where they placed him in a cell at 12:20 a.m. He was released nearly two hours later. The 18-year-old Georgetown boy will appear in Milton court for his charges.

Traffic charge

A Terra Cotta woman has been charged with driving left across the path of a vehicle after two cars were severely damaged in an accident on Winston Churchill Boulevard north of Hwy. 7 on Thursday. Police say the Terra

Cotta woman, driving a 1985 Hyundal, was southbound on Winston Churchill when she entered the northbound lane and struck a 1969 Jeep driven by a Norval man. Both drivers received light injuries.

Improper turn

Two vehicles were severely damaged in a two-car collision on Maple Avenue at Charles Street last Tuesday, police say. The accident occurred when an Acton woman, driving a 1985 GMC travelling eastbound on Maple, struck a 1987 Hyundai driven by a Glen Williams man who had changed lanes while travelling eastbound on Maple. The Hyundai then hit the curb, went into the gras and struck a stop sign before stopping against a tree. The Glen Williams man has been charged with improper turning.

Failing to yield

Police report a Milton woman has been charged with not giving the right of way after the 1900 Pontiac she was driving exited from a private roadway and struck a 1983 Mazda. The Mazda, driven by a Rockwood woman, was travelling south on Main Street in Acton and was moderately gamaged. The Pontiac was severely damaged.

Lands on roof

Police say a 1982 Dodge was severely damaged after it landed on its roof in a ditch on Hornby Line north of Steeles Avenue on Saturday. Police say the Acton woman driving the car lost control of the vehicle due to large snow drifts and packed snow on the roadway and her car skidded, went into the ditch and rolled over. She wasn't injured and no charges were laid.

Drifting snow caused a Milton man to lose control of his 1989 Toyota and strike a tree on 10th Line east of 6th Line in Halton Hills on Friday, police say. The car was severely damaged but the man received no injuries.


