Lifestyles '91' featured at Acton High School

On February 28th at Acton High School, several displays ranging from staff cooking to computer fitness assessments

will welcome students during the morning. In early afternoon, over 30 visitors will arrive at the school to offer 26 presentations

with topics such as: Aerobics, Martial Arts, Love or Iratuation, A Career as a Pilot or Social Worker, Life in Pro Football, Stress Management, Yoga, Studying Effectively, Raising Responsible Parents and Teachers, Dealing with College, Animal Care, and many others.

Each student will attend three sessions is repeated for the three time slots during the afternoon. The long-term plan is to repeat such an event every three years and as a result, senior students will be offered first priority on their choices as they will not have the opportunity again at Acton High School.

Conservation award winners

The Halton Region Conservation Authority recently announced the 1990 winners of the Ralph Sherwood Conservation Award.

Each winner received a plaque at the Authority's 1991 Inaugural Meeting on February 14, 1991.

Twelve worthy nominations were received for the award which is named after Ralph Sherwood, - a longstanding and distinguished former member of the Halton Authority.

Each year, the award is presented to people who have made an outstanding contribution to conservation in the Halton watershed.

Brian Penman, Chairman of the Selection Committee and Vice-Chairman of the Authority said, "It is gratifying to see that interest in the program has increased and indirectly reflects the interest in conservation by the community."

The awards program, initiated in 1982, has three categories: educational, institutional and individual.

In the educational category, Lord Elgin High School in Burlington was selected for an impressive conservation program called project biosphere.

Students helped restore natural habitat along a section of Appleby Creek in Burlington by planting hundreds of trees. The project was done in conjunction with the Conservation Authority and the City of Burlington and represents an excellent example of how students working on environmental projects can make a difference. The project also included an educational component that involved an environmental conference and an ecology awareness program for several elementary schools.

In the Institutional category, the Smokey Hollow Committee from Waterdown was selected for their successful effort to preserve and protect a section of the Grindstone Creek that has historical significance.

The volunteer committee has worked very hard towards a goal of creating a passive park that not only preserves some interesting local history but also protects the natural valley and allows safe public access. The committee co-ordinated the development of the master plan for the area and raised the funds for the project that will begin in 1991.

In the final category for Individuals, Professor Doug Larson from the University of Guelph was selected for his work on the ancient cedar forest community situated on the cliff edge of the Niagara Escarpment.

During the past two years, Professor Larson has been actively involved with studying the ancient forest community that was discovered in Halton in 1988. His discovery and related research on the entire escarpment has generated an incredible amount of publicity on the significance of the Niagara Escarpment including national coverage on all major television networks, magazine articles and extensive newspaper coverage. His discovery and research has not only focused attention on the significance of the Niagara Escarpment but has emphasized the fragile nature of the resource.
