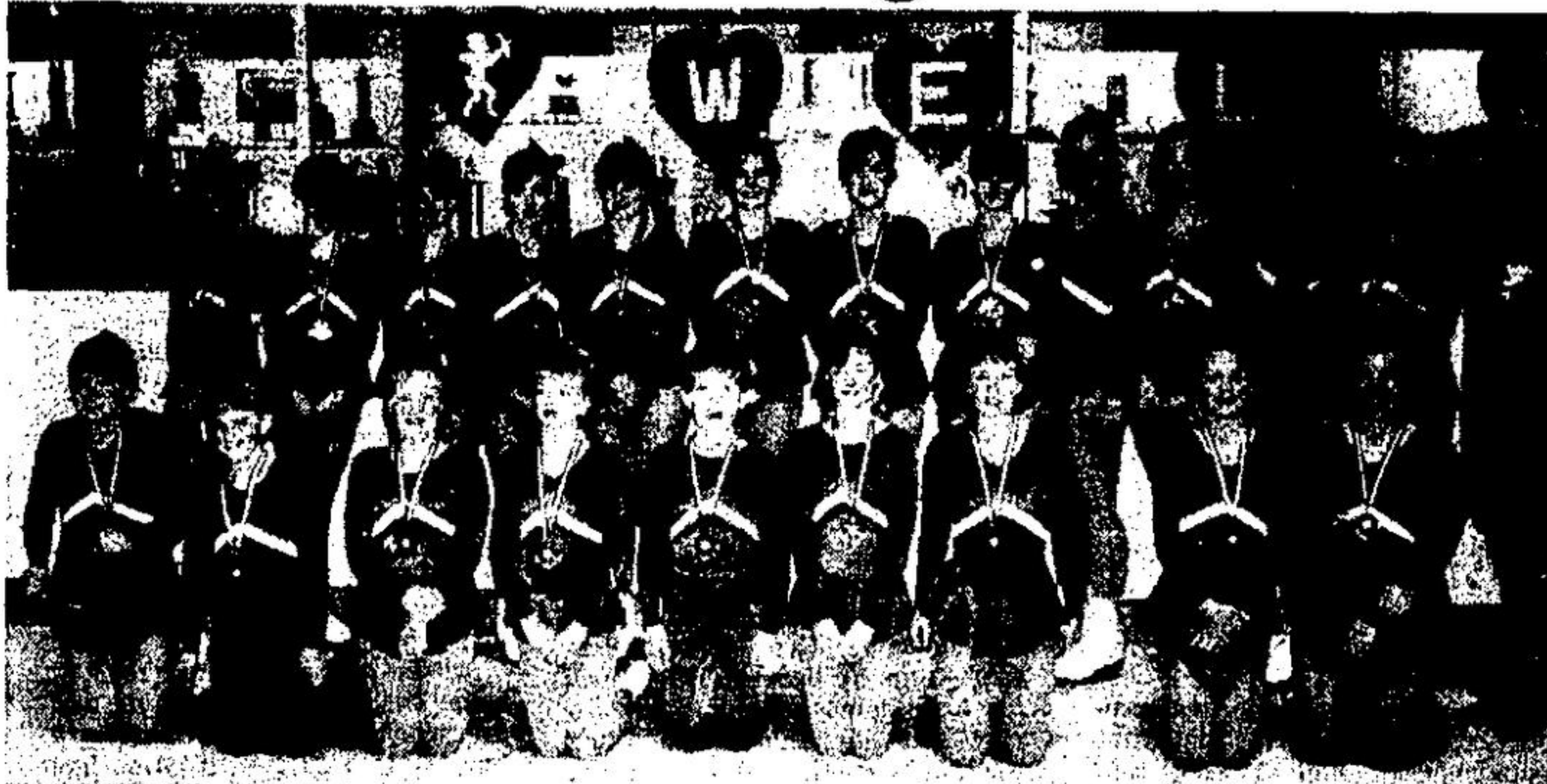


Two good showings for skaters
