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French policy will remain the same

Due to the shortage of quality Immersion and French Core teachers in Ontario and the potential costs of program expansion, a French Policy Review Committee, made up of 11 Halton Board of Education Trustees, is making no significant changes to the board's French policy.

"There appears to be no compelling reasons to change our present policy significantly," said the committee, in a report presented to the board Thursday night.

The committee said the shortage of French teachers, costs of program expansion, lack of compelling research evidence to suggest changing existing Halton French programs along with the anticipated publication of new guidelines for Immersion and Extended French, influenced the committee's recommendations.

Aside from not significantly changing the present French

policy, the committee recommended that administration review the curriculum of immersion and extended French programs in conjunction with ministry guidelines. They likely won't be available for another 18 months.


Other recommendations include: teachers and librarians with French proficiency be placed in French centres where possible; that classroom space for core French become a priority and that schools provide remediation in core French within existing resources.

The French policy basically says students should acquire recognizable competency in French with immersion and French extended programs made available in identified schools and accessible to all students who opt to take the program. The Board will likely vote on the recommendations at their next meeting.









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
