Shipwrecked — good pirate picture

When was the last time you saw a good pirate picture (besides Errol Flynn on the late show)? Shipwrecked is a pleasing excursion into well-known territory, the old young-man-goes-to-sea and ends-up-on-a-desert-island-fighting-pirates scenario. Despite the predictable plot the movie is solidly entertaining, worthwhile fare for the whole family.

Stian Smestad (the spelling may be wrong) plays Harken, a boy whose father returns from sea with a bad leg and no money. In order to save the family farm he takes a commission as a ship's

boy and leaves the lonely fjords of Norway for warmer climes. He is meant to be in charge two years before the mast.

The Norwegian crew is good to him and all is well until their arrival in England. There they are joined by Captain Howell (Gabriel Byrne), a captain of the Queen's Navy, who is supposed to protect the ship from pirates as they head into the south seas. Little does anyone know that Howell is dead and in his place is the notorious Merrick, a pirate with a bloody past and a mission to accomplish. He soon kills the captain and takes command of the ship.

Can Harken save his mates, a stowaway, and himself from certain death? This being a Walt Disney movie, you know he will. Shipwrecked comes to a satisfying conclusion, with some good thrills along the way.

The acting is all right, with Gabriel Byrne as the only known name, and he is suitably menacing as Merrick. The scenery is wonderful, and the action fast-paced. This is a film for the family, a much more rewarding experience than the recent King Ralph, and far prettier to watch. It may be predictable, but when you're a kid, isn't that kind of reassuring?

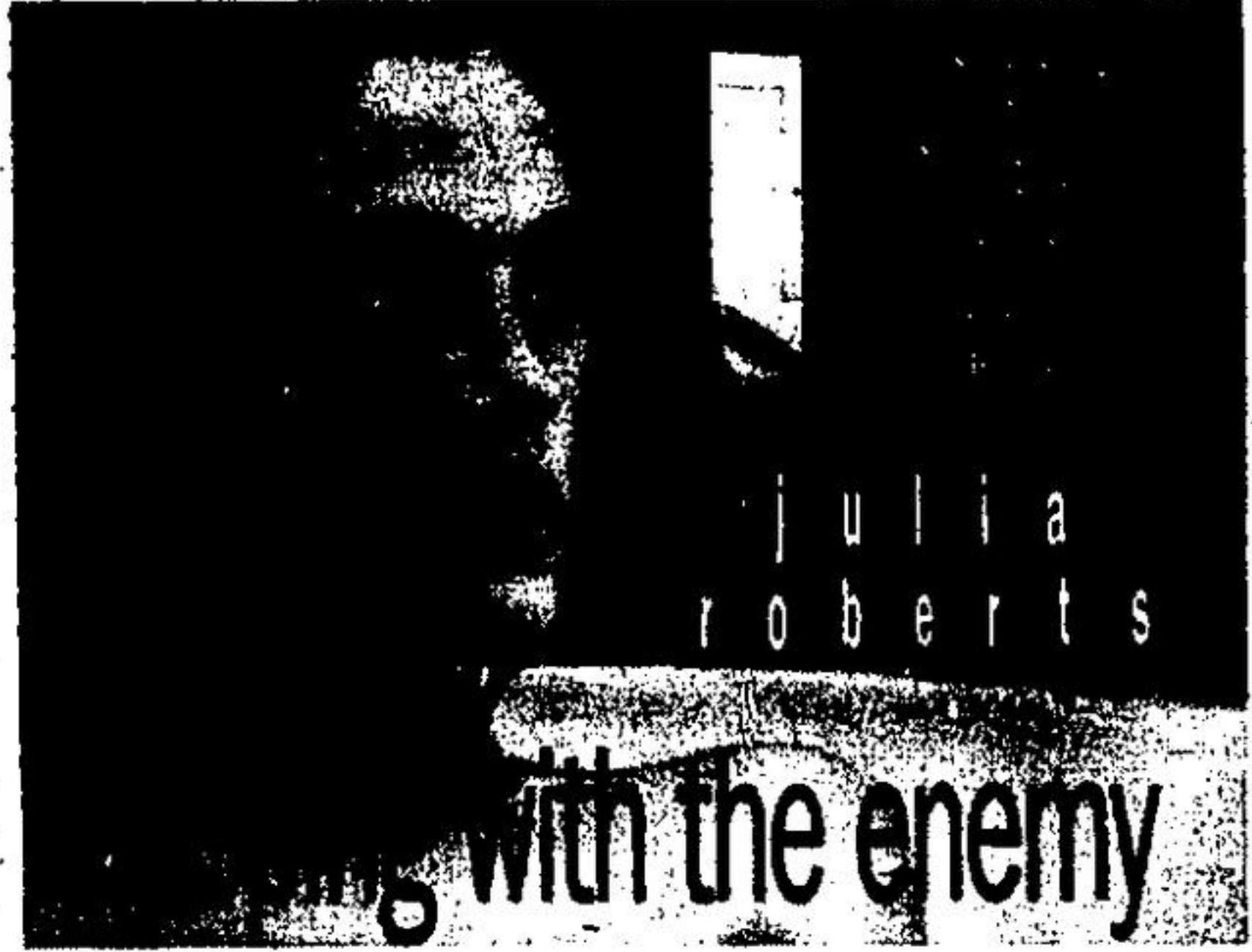

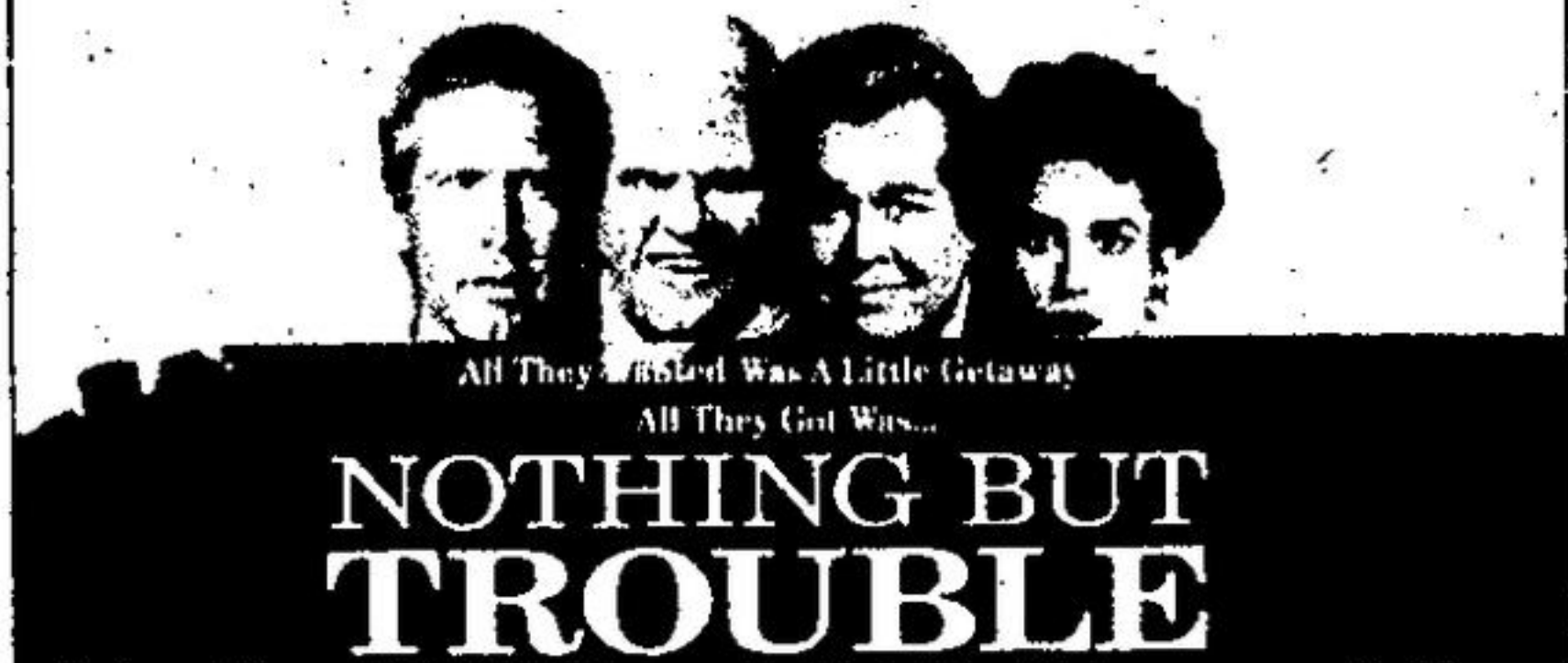
