Credit card costs must be understood

Federal Consumer and Corporate Affairs Minister Pierre Blais has released the March 1991 issue of "Credit Card Costs." This publication, issued quarterly, provides timely, comparative information about interest rates and other costs related to the use of credit cards.

Credit cards are used for more than 546 million transactions in Canada each year. The number of cards in circulation in Canada, a country of only 19.5 million adults, reached an estimated 51 million in 1990. The number of merchant outlets accepting VISA and MasterCard had doubled since 1980.

"It is important to read the monthly statements carefully," warned Mr. Blais. "If possible, pay off the full balance within the grace period."

He encouraged consumers to be aware of the cost of credit cards as compared with other forms of credit, such as lines of credit and personal loans, and to make sure that they understand the terms of the cards they use.

"While your credit card is a convenient payment method, you must understand the costs associated with using it," said Mr. Blais.


