### Milton Choristers to perform

Choirs all over the world are celebrating the 200th anniversary of Mozart's death with renditions of his last composition, the Requiem. The Milton Choristers are no exception as they plan to perform the choral work on March 24, 7 p.m. at St. Paul's United Church; Main Street, Milton.

The 45-voice community choir will be led by Dr. Patricia Phillips in her first season as musical director.

The Requiem is famous for being the last work Mozart ever wrote. In fact, it was not finished by him but by two students hired by his widow, Constanze. It was first performed in 1793.

The Choristers also plan to present 3 of the 6 movements of Solemn Vespers which Mozart wrote in 1780. The evening plans to be full of "Mozart Magic" with special appearance by Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart in period costume.

## World premiere set for Guelph

The world premiere of a new work by Canadian composer Peter Tiefenbach, with text by Paul Quarington, will be presented at this year's Guelph Spring Festival.

The work, Opening Day, will be performed as part of the Laughton, Humphreys and Titterington concert on April 26 at St. George's Church.

Sometimes touching, often humorous, Opening Day protrays the beginning of fishing season from an unusual point of view that of a fish. The theme is the human species' intrusion upon the river, the animal world's "perfect place."

Cold coffee and bitter brew." The author of this verse, Paul Quarington, is no stranger to music or the music industry. As part of the duo, Quarington/Worthy, he enjoyed much success including a No. 1 single, "Baby and the Blues" in 1980. He is also the author of a critically acclaimed novel about popular music entitled Whale

Music and has written several

novels on the sports world. Composer Peter Tiefenbach has worn several hats in his illustrious career. In addition to being a first rate composer, he is also a conductor, church musician, vocal coach and children's entertainer. He will, in fact, be wearing two of his hats at this year's Festival, that of composer (Opening Day) and of children's entertainer (Trio Mio concerts -May 19).

The performers of this exciting new work, Laughton, Humphreys and Titterington are each highly respected musicians. Stuart Laughton was principal trumpet for the Hamilton Philharmonic and a founding member of the Canadian Brass, incredibly enough, before his twentieth birthday. Soprano Wendy Humphreys has performed with many Canadian Orchestras as well with the Netherlands Chamber Orchestra and Britain's Allegri String Quartet. David Titterington is

one of a select group of organists who have established themselves as soloists on the international circuit. Together the trio promises a wonderful evening's entertainment which will also include works by Bach and contemporary composer Petr Eben.

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
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
