The league leading Dunlop Insurance team, the Rockers, crushed the Lopers' Swimmers squad by a 12-5 count. The Lopers' rink was in contention for five ends, but a disastrous sixth finished them off. The Dunlop rink is hoping for two more steady performances to stay on top.

In the game between Bill Smith Auto Wingnuts and Kendale Hackers, the Hackers also captured five ends and the loss. They gave up two three pointers and a single to their Bill Smith led opponents. The final count registered 7-6 for the local auto parts retailer.
