# Lumbermen have busy weekend

Georgetown Beaver Lumber Major Novice team had a busy weekend playing in the Streetsville tournament on Friday and the Timmy Tyke hockey tournament on Saturday at Maple Leaf Gardens as their season came to a close.

Lumbermen were eliminated from the 24th annual Streetsville tournament by virtue of a 3-2 loss to the Penetang Bryant's Jeweller club.

The first two games of the tourney were played against the Oshawa Shoppers Drug Mart team with total goals being the deciding factor. Georgetown lost this series five goals to four with the games being split 1-1. Georgetown won the 1st game 2-0 and lost the second 5-2.

The second game against Oshawa was highlighted by Brent McClung's goal, assisted by Scott Ellis at 3:36 of the second period to bring the score to 2-1 in Oshawa's favor.

Lumbermen scored again in the third period with Matt Hotham finding the twine, assisted by Dan Smith on a scramble play at the 4:42 mark. This made the score 4-2. Oshawa finished the scoring at the 20 second mark to win the series and the game.

The third game of this tournament was a real thriller with Penetang the eventual victor, 3-2.

After a scoreless first period, Dan Smith put the Lumbermen in front with an unassisted goal after deking out the goaltender.

Matt Hotham put the Lumbermen ahead 2-0 by converting a pass by Scott Ellis while shorthanded at the 2:24 mark of the third period.

Penetang then scored three goals in a span of 1:37 to snatch victory from the jaws of defeat.

Notable Georgetown con-

tributors included Roddy Heinz, Tyler Pearce and Ryan Carter in goal, Trevor Cash, Jay Campbell and Jay Hayes.

Lumbermen came up big at Maple Leaf Gardens on Saturday with their finest offensive display of the season, a 9-0 victory against Toronto's Bert Robinson All-Stars in the 36th annual Timmy Tyke hockey tournament.

The first period saw Jay Campbell open the scoring at the 2:49 mark on an unassisted breakaway from centre ice with a deke to put the Lumbermen ahead 1-0. Brent McClung put the Georgetown club up 2-0 with a high shot just under the crossbar from the slot, assisted by Scott Ellis and Jamie Larocque at the 3:31 mark.

Matt Hotham finished off the scoring in the first period at the 6:51 mark with a behind the net goal assisted by Roddy Heinz. The score at the end of the first period was Georgetown 3, Toronto 0.

The second period saw Brent McClung complete his hat trick with two efforts at 5:55 and 6:40. Jay Hayes assisted on the goal by McClung. Trevor Cash converted a McClung rebound at 7:57 to bring the score to 6-0. Dan Smith converted a three-way pass play with Heinz and Hotham to bring the second period to a close with Georgetown leading 7-0.

The third period found Bryan Stuttard scoring at 3:46 assisted by Roddy Heinz. Dan Smith closed out the scoring at 5:56 assisted by Jamie Larocque and Joshua Travers. Final score, Georgetown 9, Toronto 0.

Notable Georgetown contributors included shutout goaltending by Tyler Pearce and Ryan Carter, and solid two-way performances from Derrick Elliot and Ryan Bobor.

This tournament raised \$100,000 for the Easter Seal Society. Derrick Elliot and Jamie Larocque both won a one-week hockey school engagement for selling the most tickets, \$1,300 and \$700 respectively. Ryan Carter, Tyler Pearce, Scott Ellis, Bryan Stuttard, Derek Elliot and Jamie Larocque all received plaques for selling in excess of \$250.

Lumbermen were eliminated from the Tri-County playoffs by virtue of a tie-breaking method that the team would like to see changed.

They finished the round-robin series with a 4-1-1 record - identical to the Oakville Rangers. In head to head competition between Georgetown and Oakville, Georgetown won one game and tied the other. The deciding factor to break the tie was not head to head competition, but rather the goal differential in each round-robin game.

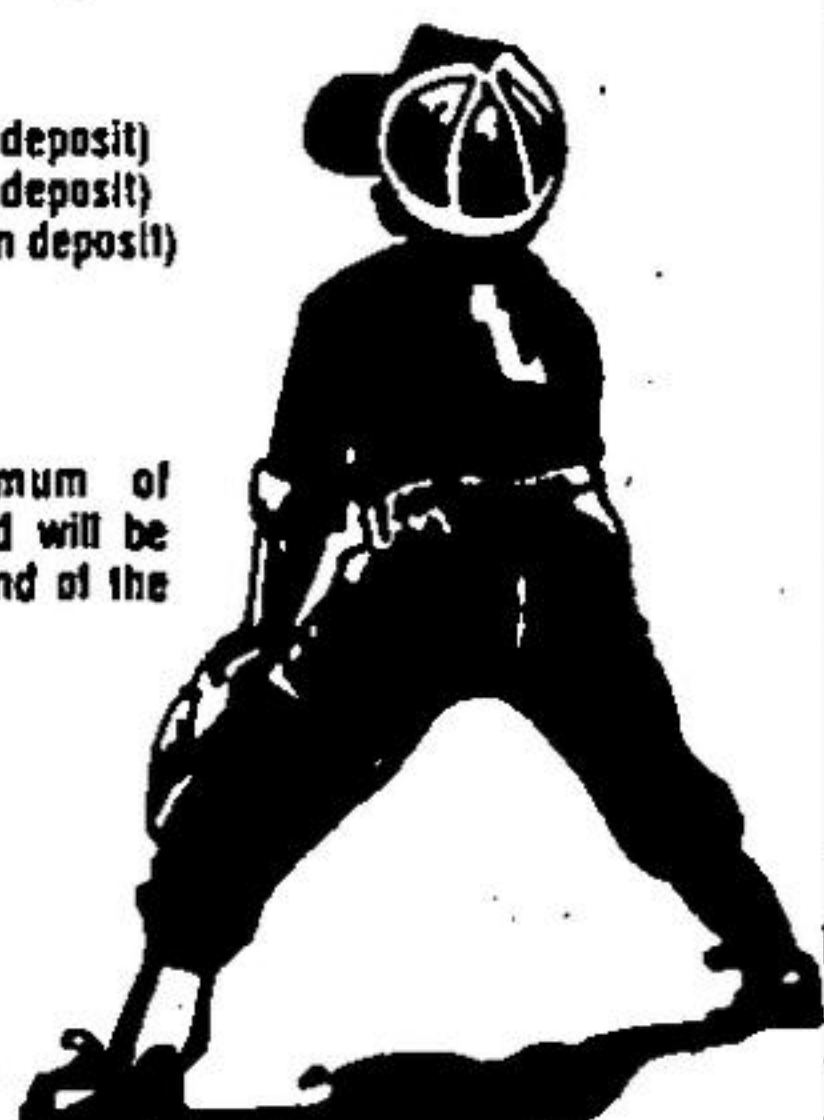
