Georgetown Cancer Society Unit opens 1991 campaign

If last Tuesday morning's jam-packed turnout at North Halton Golf and Country Club was any indication, the 1991 Fundraising Campaign of the Georgetown Unit of the Canadian Cancer Society will be a roaring success.

The Tuesday morning event was billed as a fundraising and kickoff breakfast for the Georgetown Unit's 1991 Fundraising Campaign and attendance-wise, the Georgetown charitable organization received tremendous support. Representatives from a

number of service clubs as well as members of the Georgetown business community took advantage of the healthy breakfast repast as did Town of Halton Hills Mayor, Russ Miller and members of town council, Halton-Peel MP Garth Turner and Bill Chard, standing in for Halton North MPP Noel Duignan.

The breakfast was sponsored by Curwood Packaging (Canada) Ltd. of Georgetown and appreciation for the company's support of the 1991 Fundraising Campaign was expressed by Master of Ceremonies, Paul C. Armstrong, also the Chairman of the 1991 Campaign Team.

The 1991 campaign, target for the Georgetown Unit of the Canadian Cancer Society is \$122,000 with fundraising events galore planned.

The Daffodil Campaign officially began last Thursday and volunteers will soon be out canvassing door-to-door.

Two of the highlights of the 1991 Cancer fundraising campaign were also stressed at the Tuesday morning breakfast session.

On Sunday, June 15, at Cedarvale Park in Georgetown, the now-annual Classic Cars for Cancer show will take place. The man in charge of the particular fundraising endeavor, Neil Young, noted that \$11,500 was raised at last year's event.

On June 24, the 15th Annual Bill Smith Invitational Golf Tournament for Charity will be held at North Halton Golf and Country Club and once again, the Georgetown Unit of the Canadian Cancer Society will be the beneficiary of funds raised.

Since 1977, in excess of \$165,000, has been raised for the Georgetown Unit of the Canadian Cancer Society by the Bill Smith Tournament.

Guest speaker at the Tuesday morning fundraising event was Barbara Rieger, who has been associated with the Georgetown Unit of the Canadian Cancer

Society for three years and who currently holds the position of Education Chairperson.

Ms. Rieger stressed the importance of a proper diet in battling cancer.

The theme of the 1991 Cancer Fundraising Campaign is: "Your make a difference."

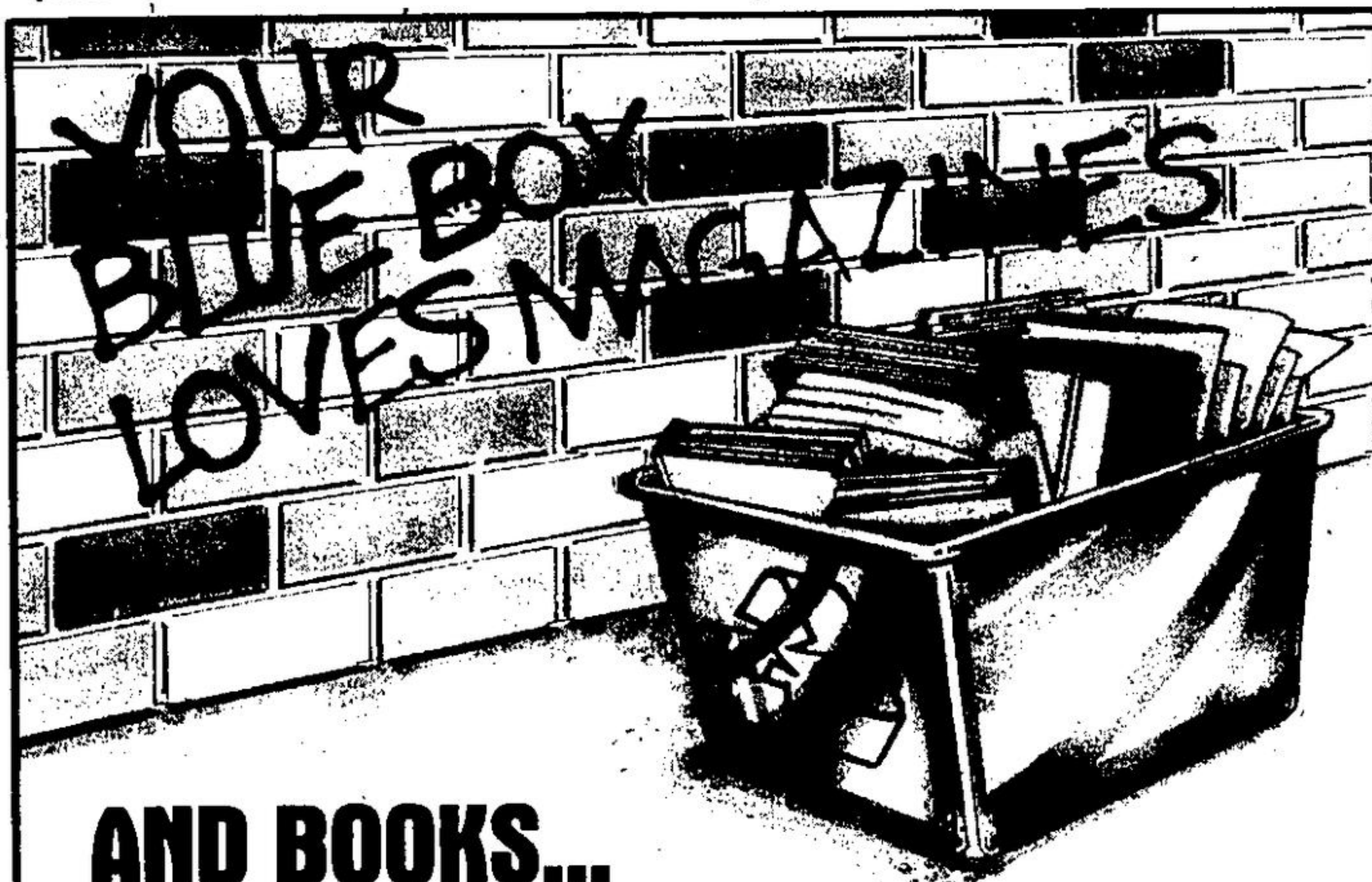
The over 400 volunteers who work for the Georgetown Unit of the Canadian Cancer Society are hoping this bears true in 1991.

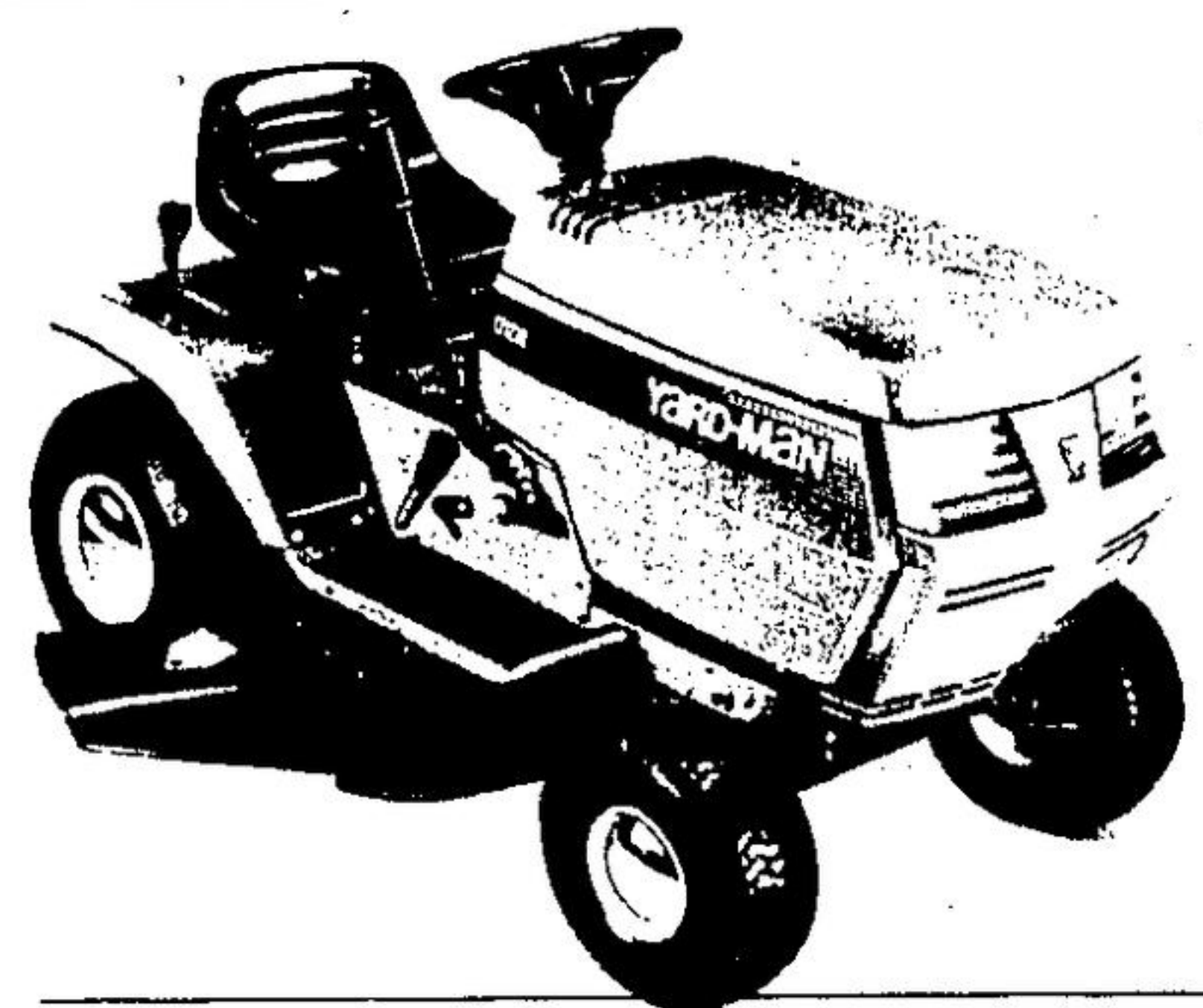
